

# BOY HAS YEARS OF WILD ADVENTURES

## Fifteen-Year-Old Lad From San Francisco Tells Strange Story in Pittsburg.

### WAS SHANGHAIED BY CREW OF BRITISH SHIP

#### Declares He Was Mistreated by United States Consul in Brazil.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Dec. 28.—Howard Ray, a 15-year-old lad, on his way to San Francisco, hoping to find his home and his parents whom he left before the earthquake, told a wonderful story of adventure as a sailor, of being shanghaied by the crew of a British ship and of being mistreated by a United States consul in Brazil to whom he applied for relief, in the police station here last night, when he applied for lodging.

When 13 years old, he said, he was shipped as cabin boy at San Francisco on the steamship Chile, bound for Cape Town. As cabin boy and as ordinary seaman, often performing the full duties of a grown man, he worked his way on different ships to Sydney, Melbourne, and to many other points, finally landing at Rio Janeiro, Brazil, where he was seized with a desire to return home. He shipped on a boat bound for Norfolk, Va., and reached that port without adventure and was given his pay for the voyage and his discharge.

**Kidnaped by Sailors.**

Walking through the streets of Norfolk, he says, he was suddenly seized by sailors from the British vessel, the Titalia, and carried aboard, where he was kept prisoner for several days until the ship sailed. Then he was released and put to work as a sailor. The ship was short of men and he was forcibly taken on as a recruit. In the course of time he was again in Rio Janeiro, where he complained to the United States consul. That official, the lad says, gave him curt treatment, brushed up the fact of his having been shanghaied after several conferences with the British consul, and finally refused to help him to get back to the United States, because he could not produce proof that he was an American citizen. The British consul, the lad says, secured him a chance to work his way back to New York, where he arrived a few days ago. He stole his way to Altoona on a freight train, he says, and the authorities at the latter place gave him transportation to Pittsburg. He hopes to give his story here and at other points that will take him to San Francisco. Whether he will find his parents there, he does not know. He has heard nothing from them since the earthquake. Pittsburg authorities will probably give him some help.

# MOTHER STARVES FOR HER CHILDREN'S SAKE

## After Weeks of Privation, Dies Happy, Knowing Little Ones Are Cared For.

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—Happy that her children, for whom she had sacrificed everything, even the last scraps of food, had at last found friends, Mrs. Phyllis Prisco died at a Brooklyn hospital of starvation. Mrs. Prisco's husband has been dead some months and with four little ones, the eldest 4 years, the youngest 4 months old, to care for, she labored day and night until she was taken ill. Her pride prevented her from asking for aid, so she saved what bits of food she could obtain for her little ones, while she gradually grew weaker and weaker from the lack of food.

The last bite of crusts went for the children's Christmas dinner, and then in the morning neighbors heard the crying of the little ones in the nursery room in which the mother and children lived. They entered and found Mrs. Prisco dying and the children weak from the lack of food and from cold. The police removed the mother to a hospital and the Children's society took care of the little ones.

When the physicians found that all hope for the mother was gone, the little ones were sent for and Mrs. Prisco was assured that they would be cared for. The children were happy again, for they had plenty of food and toys and as the tired mother realized that their sufferings were over, her heart was stilled and her sacrifice was complete.
