GOOD ROADS BILLS ARE UP IN HOUSE

Two of the Several Measures Are Pushed Through After Long Debate.

BILLS, OF COURSE, CREATE COMMISSIONS GALORE

Gang Which Dominates Affairs Political in Utah Let Nothing Get Away.

The house on Monday took up, considered and passed two of the several road bills which have been introduced by the house.

There was a prolonged debate over the bill. Representative Archibald wanted to cut the commission to three in number, as the bill meant politics pure and simple.

COMMISSIONERS OF INDIAN WAR RECORDS

Proposed Measure Which, of Course, Means a Commission, Is Introduced.

In the house Monday Mr. Morris introduced a bill which creates a board of commissioners to be known as "Commissioners on Indian War Records..."

The duties of the board shall be to ascertain the names of the persons who were members of any organization performing military duty during any of the Indian wars or expeditions against the Indians...

The adjutant general of the state, chairman of the board, is hereby appointed by the governor, as aforesaid, shall have power, by virtue of their office, to administer oaths, take testimony and subpoena witnesses.

SENATOR KUCHLER DEFINES POSITION

Tells Committee From Weber County Where He Stands Upon Liquor Question.

IS OPPOSED ABSOLUTELY TO STATE-WIDE PROHIBITION

Believes That Present Laws Upon the Statute Books Should Be Enforced.

There was handed to Senator Kuchler on Monday petitions from the people of Weber county bearing 4600 signatures. These petitions were presented to the senator from Weber by a committee of six, headed by Apostle D. O. McKay.

The committee called on Senator Kuchler at his apartments in the Wilcox hotel. Apostle McKay was the spokesman and he presented the petitions and urged the senator to do all in his power to bring about state-wide prohibition.

Kuchler Defines Position. "My campaign in Weber county was made upon a platform in which no mention was made of, or allusion made to, the liquor traffic in any way."

"During the campaign," continued Senator Kuchler, "I was approached by Rev. McCreary, soliciting and asking me to support, if elected, local option in Utah."

Should Enforce Present Laws. "Now, Apostle McKay, do you not know that were you to take these 4600 people represented by this petition and lead them to the office of the mayor and city council of Ogden, who have the power to revoke any or every license held by a saloon in Ogden, Utah, by tomorrow, at this time you could close every saloon in operation in our city?"

Conference in the Open. The conference was in the open. The talks were free and frank. There was also effort, to attend a factory. The newspaper men, who were present expressed the opinion that the conclusion of the conference that the plea made by Mr. Richards was the strongest heard by them during this session of the legislature.

CORPORATIONS MUST PAY AN ADDITIONAL TAX. Under a bill introduced in the senate Monday, by Senator Badger, corporations, both foreign and domestic, are called upon to pay an additional tax upon their license and a percentage upon their authorized capital stock in excess of \$20,000.

Introduced in the Senate to Steal the Fire Apparatus of Zion.

UNDER CONTROL. BILLS OF FEDERAL BUNCH

Take Possession of Department and All Property Belonging Thereto.

Some ago, in the legislature of this state, a bill was introduced to confiscate the property of Salt Lake City under the control of the federal bunch, which means the royal household of Utah.

The senate killed the bill, but the federal bunch, had four bills under the control of the church recently by the Smoot. Mouth, which also saw to it that three bills were introduced in the legislature again.

Now Senator Marks with senate bill, 80, introduces the measure which means the federal bunch will take control of the two wings of the city. But they will not have possession of the constitution of the city.

Within thirty days after the introduction of this act, the mayor shall be appointed in all cities of the first class, a board consisting of three persons and fireholders in said cities shall be a member of the board, and with the consent of the senate, the board shall have the power to make appointments.

Board Wants the Earth. Sec. 14. All appropriations made by the city council for the fire and police departments shall be under the absolute, full and complete control of the respective boards of fire and police.

Terms of Office. Sec. 15. The terms of all officers, employees and agents, including the chiefs of the present fire and police departments in cities of the first class, shall be under the absolute, full and complete control of the respective boards of fire and police.

But Why Do This? Sec. 20. The mayor of each city, except cities of the first class, of 12,000 and more inhabitants in this state is authorized to cause to be prepared and placed to the credit of the fund belonging to the department to which the property so sold belongs.

WOULD CONFISCATE PROPERTY

by and with the advice and consent of the city council and approval of the mayor, appoint all subordinate officers, employees, men or agents in his department, and in no manner fill all vacancies in the same.

Sec. 13. During the last quarter of the calendar year the said fire and police boards shall present to the city council of its respective city a detailed statement of the money necessary to defray the expenses of the fire and police departments of the city for the succeeding year, together with a statement of the probable income therefrom.

Sec. 25. The head of each department, except in cities of the first class, may at any time suspend any subordinate officer, employee, man or agent employed therein, when in his judgment the good service of the city requires it.

Sec. 27. Chapter 132, title 13, Compiled Laws of Utah, 1907, and all other acts in relation to the fire and police departments of cities of the first class, are hereby repealed.

There is a movement on foot among some of the city's official family with the legislators to attempt legislation taking over from the board of public works the inspection of all public work and planning it with the city engineer's office.

Representative Russell is after the gas and electric companies. Monday he introduced a bill which declares that it shall be unlawful for any person, company, firm or corporation doing business in the state or exercising any rights or franchises from the state to charge patrons, or consumers, or customers, for the installation of meters or measuring devices...
