NEW TRAIN SERVICE IS TO BEGIN FRIDAY

OGDEN, June 18.—A new form of train service between Ogden and Brigham City will be instituted by the Ogden Rapid Transit company in connection with the U. C. T. outing in the Box Elder capital on Friday and Saturday. Three of the company's new cars have arrived, and those will form a single train to be pulled by the company's electric locomotive. The new cars, which are said to have cost about \$4000 each, arrived in the city from the St. Louis shops a few days ago. Three more cars of the same pattern will arrive in a few days.
