

MUSIC TEACHER DIES SUDDENLY

Mrs. J. L. Ege's Death During Night Attended by Strange Circumstances.

FIRE LEADS TO DISCOVERY.

Burning Bed Clothes Attracted Attention—Lifeless Body Not Touched By Flames—Some Mystery.

Mrs. J. L. Ege, a music teacher, aged about 60 years, was found dead in her room shortly before 7 o'clock this morning in a roominghouse at 25 west Fourth South street.

At the time stated roomers discovered smoke issuing from Mrs. Ege's room. An alarm was quickly turned in and the fire apparatus from station No. 4 responded.

It is known that for some time she has been taking a certain drug for her nerves and it is quite probable that some time last night she took an overdose.

RELATIVES NOTIFIED. Mrs. Ege was a widow, her husband having died some years ago. She had been rooming at the place for several months and was well thought of.

The body was removed to O'Donnell's undertaking establishment by order of Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith.

JAP SENTENCED TO TWENTY YEARS

Juzo Tsukuda, Slayer of Torihel Shin, Will Go to State Prison.

In the criminal division of the Third district court, Judge George G. Armstrong today sentenced Juzo Tsukuda, the slayer of Torihel Shin, to serve a term of 20 years in the state prison at hard labor.

Tsukuda is a Japanese, as was also his victim. The killing occurred July 4 last at Garfield, during a brawl engaged in by the two, with a number of their fellow countrymen.

PLEA FOR MERCY.

The fact that the prisoner was not able to understand English, and that his lot would necessarily therefore be unusually dreary and hard during the term of his incarceration, was pleaded to, and it was intimated by counsel that a moderate sentence against the accused would be an act of mercy, as well as justice.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—"I think it is time for the people of Chicago to exhibit moral stamina enough to annihilate plays in which bandits and desperadoes are made to pose as heroes, and I am going to start the ball rolling now."

With these words Judge Pettit, sitting in the Sheffield avenue court, began a bitter denunciation of the trashy, or "vicious" theater and perhaps laid the foundation work for reform along this line.

The judge had before him seven little boys whose minds had been poisoned by the character of plays he referred to.

As a result of what he learned the judge ordered the police to have the manager of a small theater in Lincoln avenue brought before him today and that means that boys and girls hereafter will be excluded, the house closed, or a different kind of play presented.
