

ALL WANT ROOSEVELT

Confederate Veterans Invite Him to Attend Reunion.

PLANS PREVENT ACCEPTANCE

New Orleans Intends to Spread a Great Banquet in Honor of the President's Visit—North Carolina Citizens Anxious to Greet Him.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—Senator Thomas S. Martin, of Virginia, headed a delegation representing the civic and commercial bodies of Petersburg, Va., at the White House today, their mission being to extend an invitation to President Roosevelt to attend the annual reunion of the Confederate veterans of Virginia, to be held at Petersburg Oct. 25, 26 and 27.

The President expressed regret that he would be unable to be present as at that time he would be on his trip through the South.

At the forthcoming reunion the Virginia battle flags captured during the Civil war will be returned to the organization which originally carried them, the presentation speech being made by Governor Montague.

South Extends Invitations.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—Representatives Meyer and Davis and Postmaster Thomas J. Woodward, of New Orleans, called on the President today to discuss with him his approaching visit to New Orleans. They told him that he would be as safe in New Orleans from yellow fever at the time of his visit as he was today in Washington from smallpox or typhoid fever.

The city plans to hold a banquet in honor of the President's visit.

Joseph O. Thompson, collector of internal revenue at Birmingham, Ala., also called on President Roosevelt with a committee representing the commercial bodies of Birmingham to arrange the details of the President's visit to the city on October 24.

Senator Simmons, of North Carolina, conferred with the President regarding his trip through that State. He urged the President to make a longer stop at Raleigh than has been scheduled and to make other stops in the State in addition to those arranged, but the President said he could not vary from the program now laid down.

Will Use the Pennsylvania.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 4.—The armored cruiser Pennsylvania has been selected to convey President Roosevelt from New Orleans to Norfolk on the return from his Southern trip. From Norfolk the President will be conveyed to Washington by the Mayflower. Captain Winslow has arrived here from Newport and was at the navy department today.

Norfolk Wants Him Too.

PARIS, Oct. 4.—The authorities do not expect definite action relative to Venezuela until the receipt at Washington of the report of Judge W. J. Calhoun, who went to Venezuela on a special mission for the government of the United States, who had not arrived when the last conference between Ambassador Jusserand and the officials at Washington was held. In the meantime the matter remains stationary, Venezuela not having withdrawn her action towards the French charge d'affaires, M. Taigny, in refusing to ratify with the French government through him.

Bonding Company "Welched."

Roumania is Forcing Greece.

BUCHAREST, ROUMANIA, Oct. 4.—As a sequel to the breaking off of diplomatic relations between Roumania and Greece, it was semi-officially announced today that Roumania will denounce the commercial convention with Greece, withdraw the recognition hitherto accorded to the Greek communities, increase the tolls on Grecian vessels entering Roumania ports, and tax property held by Greeks in Roumania.

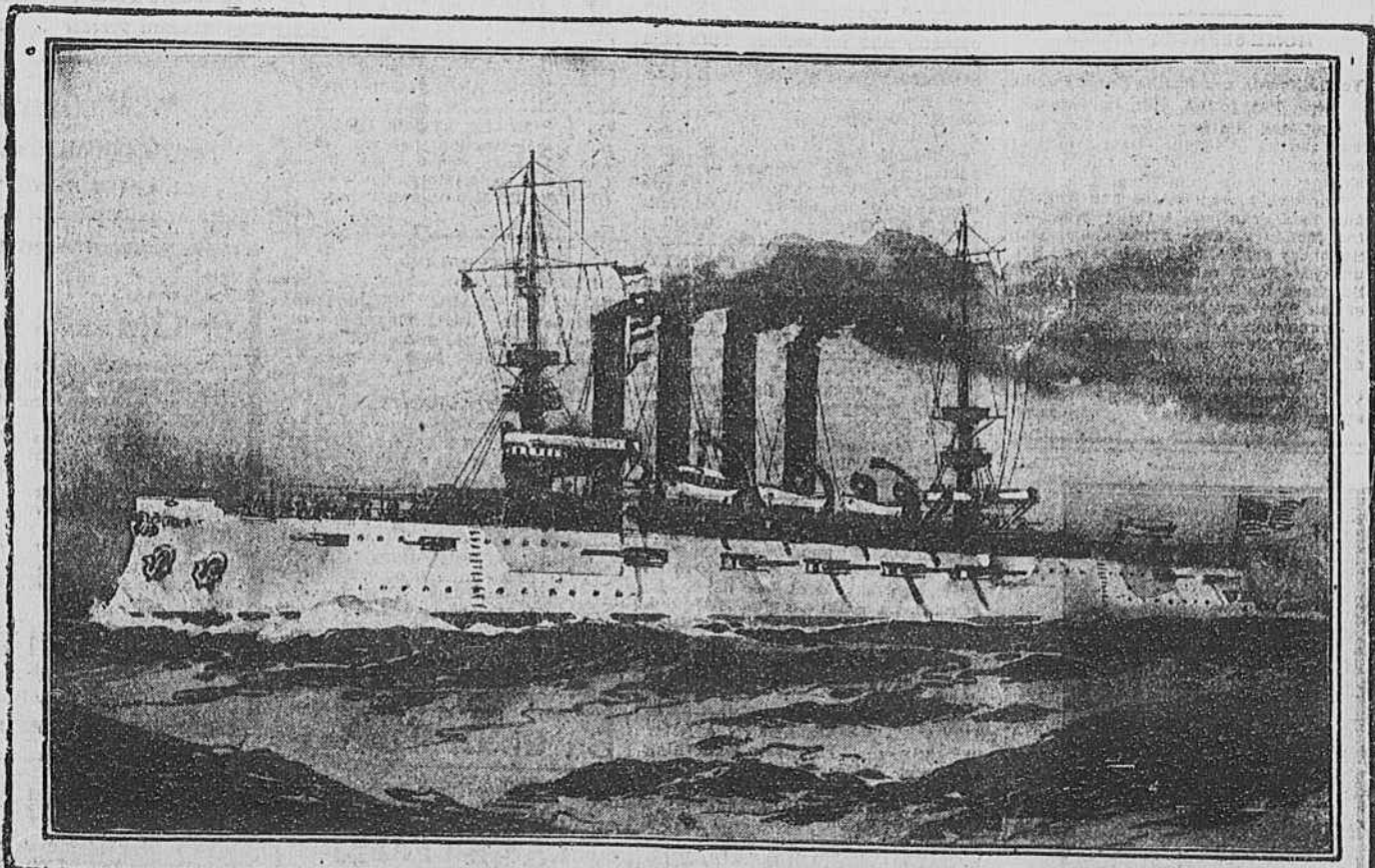
