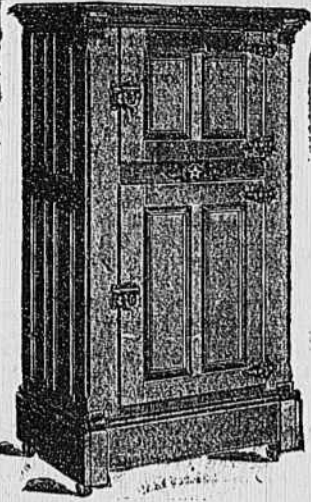

BAD CUTTING AFFAIR AT SOLDIERS' HOME

Alexander McDonald, Civil War Veteran, Stabbed in Arm and Side by Comrade.

SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR SOLDIER

According to Those Who Saw the Crime Cryan Simply Became Frenzied With the Idea of Cutting and Slashed the Old Man Twelve Times With a Knife.

Seized with a sudden mania to "carve" someone, Frank Cryan, a Spanish-American war veteran, stabbed and probably fatally wounded Alexander McDonald, a veteran of the Civil war, while in the quarters of Company C. at the National Soldiers' Home yesterday afternoon.

Mr. McDonald, who has twelve ugly gashes in his right arm and side, lies in the Home hospital in a precarious condition, while Cryan is a prisoner in the guardhouse there awaiting the termination of his victim's injuries.

Sleep in Same Barracks.
The two men are members of Company O at the Home. It is said by those who saw the cutting affray that Cryan slashed the old man without provocation. Mr. McDonald was lying on his cot reading and Cryan was sitting close by.

It is said that Cryan simply walked over to where Mr. McDonald was and whipped out his knife and began stabbing the civil war veteran in the arm and side. Before members of the company could get to Mr. McDonald's rescue Cryan had succeeded in stabbing him twelve times. Mr. McDonald's arm is badly lacerated, while the cuts in the side are deep and dangerous.

Victim Taken to Hospital.
Mr. McDonald was removed to the hospital, where the physician operated upon him and closed up the wounds. At 11 o'clock last night it was given out at the hospital that Mr. McDonald was resting well, although the physicians were unable to state how seriously the old man is injured.

Mr. McDonald served during the civil war with the United States artillery. He is known as a quiet and peaceful man among the members of his company at the home. He is 68 years old.

Cryan is a Spanish-American war man. He has been an inmate of the Home here for two years. He is about 30 years old.

The board of directors of the association met yesterday afternoon, at which time Mr. Lynch was given a unanimous call to the secretaryship. Mr. Lynch who was present announced that he will give his final answer today.

The members of the board are much pleased with Mr. Lynch from what they have seen of him, and it is expected that he will prove the right man for the place.

Mr. Lynch has traveled extensively and was connected at one time with a meeting of the Salvation Army, while in a foreign country. He is young, ambitious, full of spirit and deeply concerned in the work of the association.

At present Mr. Lynch holds a position with an insurance company at Asheville, N. C.

MR. MEARS IN THE RACE.

Candidate for Congress Denies That He Intends to Get Out of Contest.

Mr. Otho F. Mears of Eastville accompanied by Judge Blackstone arrived in Hampton last evening and is stopping at the Augusta Hotel.

Mr. Mears is a candidate for Congress in this, the first district. Mr. Mears denied the story that had been set afloat that he had intended to retire from the race. He said that he had never entered a contest yet without staying until the finish and intended to put up a strenuous canvass and is now in Hampton to visit his friends and supporters.
