

HAMPTON, PHOEBUS AND OLD POINT.

BOARD OF FISHERIES TO MEET IN NORFOLK

Members Fail to Select Hampton as Permanent Headquarters—Question Still Open.

STEAMER TO BE NAMED SWANSON

Resolution Adopted Asking the Governor to Allow the Vessel to be Called "Governor Swanson"—Warwick and Mathews Fight Go Over—Board Adjourns Session.

Without disposing of the contested oyster inspector rights in Warwick and Mathews counties the state board of fisheries adjourned yesterday afternoon to meet in Norfolk next month.

The action of the board caused two surprises. One was in the fact that it had decided to again adjourn with out settling the rights in the two counties and the other came with the announcement that the board would meet in Norfolk. It had been expected that the board would make Hampton its permanent headquarters and this may be the case when the Norfolk meeting occurs. It was thought best at this time not to change to the decision to alternate between Hampton and Norfolk.

Mr. McDonald Lee, the chairman and Mr. Wilkes Mathews, the secretary of the board, will remain over in Hampton today in order to attend to minor matters. State Senator George B. Kezzer, of Rockingham, State Senator Roger A. James, of Danville, members of the board, started for Washington last night and Senator Bland Massey will go to Richmond this morning.

Name Steamer After Governor.

At the meeting of the board yesterday a resolution was adopted requesting the Hon. Claude A. Swanson to allow the new steamer for the oyster navy to be named "Governor Swanson." The board has just purchased the steamer from Mr. Koch and it will be put into commission in the oyster navy within thirty days. The new steamer originally cost \$45,000, but the board bought it at about one-third that price. The steamer is 110 feet long, 16 1/2 feet beam, and draws eighteen feet of water.

Two Inspectors Chosen.

Two inspectors were chosen by the board, as follows: Norfolk—Mr. Charles J. Lawrence. Isle of Wight County—Mr. G. E. L. Simmons.

Most of the day was taken up by the board in hearing the Warwick case and in looking over the maps of the present survey. These were allowed to remain as they are until the next session of the board.

In an executive session the board attended to routine business.

Last night Mr. Mathew Armstrong entertained Mr. Lee, Mr. Mathews and a small gathering of friends at a stag dinner.

CHESAPEAKE AND OHIO TO BUY 500 FREIGHT CARS

Deed of Trust to the Central Trust Company Filed in the Circuit Clerk's Office.

According to a deed of trust filed in the office of the Circuit Court yesterday the Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company has just placed an order for 500 new 49-ton box freight cars.

The deed conveys a mortgage upon the property from the Chesapeake and Ohio to the Central Trust Company, of New York city, and is for \$14,181.20. It is stipulated in the deed that the money is to be used in paying for the freight cars, which were purchased from the American Car Building Company.

The deed was first placed on record in the city of Richmond, then in Warwick county, the city of Newport News, and then in Elizabeth City county. The state tax, which was paid in Richmond, amounted to \$194.

Dr. Cumming also states that he is forced to examine between 1,000 and 1,200 prospective immigrants every day of his life, so great is the desire of the people of that section to come to the states. Many of the applicants cannot pass the examination although it requires a lot of hard work for the quarantine officer.

Dr. Cumming writes that he and his family are well and happy and that they are enjoying their residence in Yokohama.
