

HAD ADVENTUROUS TRIP

Good Ship Virginia In Port With Y. M. C. A. Party.

"LUBBERS" GLAD TO BE HOME AGAIN

Storms, Calms and Fogs Tried Nerves and Patience of the Amateur Tars, but They Say They Had a Splendid Cruise.

After an adventurous voyage down the coast from New York, during which she encountered several severe storms, the trim little two-masted schooner yacht Virginia, with the sailing party of the local Young Men's Christian Association aboard, warped into a berth at Old Dominion pier A about 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

As soon as the Virginia was safely moored the association "land lubbers" eagerly climbed up on the dock glad to be on firm footing once more. The members of the party were unanimous in the verdict that they had a splendid trip, but they seemed exceedingly glad that they were safely ashore again.

Mate Washed Overboard.

With the sailing party aboard, the Virginia left this city at 8 o'clock on the morning of July 2 and on the next afternoon, while off Barnegat, the yacht ran into a severe wind and rain storm. The sea dashed high over the vessel making it exceedingly uncomfortable for the party aboard.

At 6 o'clock that evening while the storm was at its very highest a huge wave broke over the Virginia's bow dashing across her deck and sweeping the mate, William Pedrell, then on watch, overboard. When the wave struck him the mate grabbed a piece of rope on the side of the vessel, to which he clung until Captain Brown and one of the deck hands could haul him on the deck.

Many Seasick.

After the storm abated the Virginia had fair weather and strong winds during the remainder of the voyage up the coast and she dropped anchor off Brooklyn at 7:30 o'clock on the morning of July 4. Many members of the party became seasick during the voyage and several of them were about "all in" when the Virginia came to an anchorage. They soon recuperated, however, and accompanied the remainder of the party on their tour of New York city on July 4th.

While at New York the members of the party visited Coney Island, Jersey City, Brooklyn and New York, taking in all the amusement places and seeing all the sights in the Metropolis.

Compelled to Put Back.

With the entire party aboard the Virginia weighed anchor Friday evening and started on the return voyage, but soon after she reached the open sea a storm arose and she was compelled to put back to Sandy Hook, where she anchored and remained that night and all day Saturday and Saturday night. Island, returning to the yacht at dark.

None of the party was missed at that time, but about 9 o'clock that night, the keeper of the Brooklyn yacht club came along side the Virginia in a launch to bring Eddie Lash, a member of the party, who had been lost while returning from Coney Island. The keeper suggested to Mr. Lynch that he tag the members of the party the next time they went ashore.

All Sorts of Weather.

The Virginia set sail from Sandy Hook again at daylight Sunday morning, but soon after passing the Hook the yacht was becalmed and she drifted around all day Sunday and Sunday night. Monday the wind freshened some and the Virginia started down the coast, but that night she ran into a severe thunder squall, which the yacht rode bravely.

Tuesday morning the wind died down again and, fearing a storm, Captain Brown put his yacht into Beach Haven, where the party spent the afternoon. At Beach Haven Messrs. Robert A. Davis, William M. Parker and W. O. Heath left the party and came to this city by rail.

Nearly Went Over.

Favored by fair winds the Virginia set sail from Beach Haven early Wednesday morning and arrived off Delaware Breakwater that night. During the trip to the Breakwater a sudden squall struck the boat almost capsizing it. Most of the "lubbers" were below deck at the time and when the Virginia reeled to one side they all rushed on deck, thinking that the vessel was going down. The staunch craft soon righted herself, however, and proceeded on her voyage.

Wednesday night the yacht made good time but while off Hog Island early yesterday morning she ran into a heavy fog bank, which caused the mate to lose his bearing. The vessel sailed around in the fog until just before noon when Cape Charles light was sighted and she was headed into the capes.

Having fair winds again the Virginia passed in the Capes about noon yesterday, arriving here yesterday afternoon. The following were aboard the yacht when she arrived at pier A: Messrs. W. R. Lynch, J. E. T. Hunter, W. B. Colonna, W. E. Hull, Fred Barrett, John Hamilton, Leroy Gray, Walter McFall, Eddie Lash, M. Danielson, A. Osolin, G. W. Meadows, Joseph Duncas, Arnold Buxton and John Watson. Those who went to New York with the party, but returned to this city by rail, were: Messrs. Robert A. Davis, W. M. Parker, W. O. Heath, Robert A. McMillan, Albert Daughtrey and Frank Lenz.

While at sea the members of the party amused themselves with social games, story telling and such sports as could be pulled off on the yacht. Last Sunday religious exercises, conducted by Mr. Lynch, were held on the yacht and were participated in by every member of the party.

ARGUED OVER SALARIES

Trustees Have Trouble Deciding What to Pay Teachers.

SLIGHT INCREASE IS GRANTED

New Teachers Will Receive Forty Instead of Thirty-Five Dollars Per Month—Drawing Instructor May Resign Because of Cut.

After wrangling for nearly two hours the school trustees last night finally succeeded in reaching an agreement on the salaries of the public school teachers, making but one decided change in the standard heretofore maintained. This change increases the salary of new grammar school teachers from \$35 to \$40 a month. The board has already passed a resolution against electing inexperienced teachers for the city schools and it is thought that the increase in the salary of beginners will tend to raise the standard of education in the grammar schools.

There was some disagreement among the trustees as to the salary to be paid the special teacher in drawing, several of the members wanting to make her salary \$65 while others were in favor of reducing it to \$60 a month. After a heated discussion the salary was made \$60 a month. It is understood that Miss Elizabeth Ivy, who was elected to instruct the pupils in drawing has refused an offer of \$70 a month from Superintendent Glass, of the Lynchburg schools and it is now thought that the action of the board last night will cause her to go to Lynchburg. In the event that she does take such action, Mrs. Fred M. Barrett, who was last night elected a substitute teacher, or teacher in drawing, probably will teach drawing next session.

In Regular Session.

The school board met in regular session in the High school building at 8 o'clock last night with President Puckett in the chair, and the following members present: Barrett, Cooper, Harrison, Phillips, Sibly, Hudgins and Hawkins.

Messrs. Harrison and Sibly, who were recently elected trustees by the city council, took the oath of office before Superintendent of Schools W. C. Morton last night. Mr. C. G. Smith, who was also elected with Messrs. Harrison and Sibly, is out of the city, but he will take the oath at the next meeting of the board. The board adopted a resolution offered by the rules and regulations committee authorizing a special committee to ascertain the cost of purchasing and installing apparatus for teaching domestic science in the High school during the session of 1906-'07. The president appointed Messrs. Phillips, Barrett and Cooper the special committee, and named Superintendent of Schools W. C. Morton an ex-officio member of the committee.

Upon the recommendation of the rules and regulations committee the board elected Miss Alice Coleman, of Signpage, Va., a special teacher in music for the session of 1906-'07 and elected the following substitute teachers: Mrs. A. C. Peachy, Mrs. E. J. Roberts and Misses Olive Marlowe, Nellie Foley, Lucy Moss and Nannie Clements.

Mary Harmon was elected teacher for the colored schools and the wife of N. B. Clarke, principal of colored schools, No. 2, was named a substitute teacher.

Report of Committees.

The finance committee submitted the following report on the finances of the board:

Collections to date from all sources \$38,371 89 Disbursements to date 32,765 75 Cash in hands of city treasurer 5,605 05

The buildings and grounds committee submitted a lengthy report on the various supplies needed in the schools for the next session and the board ordered the committee to advertise for bids on the supplies. Superintendent of Schools W. C. Morton submitted his report on the enrollment and daily attendance of public schools during the tenth school month ending June 8, 1906.
