

### CHICAGO-NEW YORK GAME IS FORFEITED

#### Police at Request of Giants' Management Bars Umpire Johnstone From Grounds.

### FEAR OF RIOTS CAUSE OF ACTION

Both Teams Claim Contest, But Final Decision Left to Board of Directors—Free Fight Winds Up Boston-Pittsburg Series—Manager of the Home Team Attacks Umpire.

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Something unique in baseball occurred today, when the game which was to have been played as the third of the present series between the New York and Chicago National League clubs did not take place on the Polo grounds.

Each club claims that the other forfeited, so the board of directors must straighten out matters and a lengthy wrangle is bound to ensue. So far as the National League can decide the unplayed game at present, Chicago has been officially declared the winner 9 to 0, by forfeit.

Umpires Not Allowed in. At yesterday's game, the second of the series, there was a good deal of ill-feeling on both sides on account of accusations rendered by Umpire Johnstone.

When Johnstone and Emslie, the umpires assigned by President Pulliam, arrived at the entrance to the Polo Grounds today, Johnstone was refused admittance and Emslie, who accompanied him, declined to take any part in the game so long as his associate was not allowed to perform his official function.

Johnstone then declared the game forfeited by New York to Chicago, basing his decision on the local club's refusal to admit him to the grounds.

Crowd Yells: "Play Ball!" The crowd, which numbered about 11,000, wandered at the delay and yelled "Play ball!" repeatedly while managers McGraw and Chance held a consultation.

McGraw called upon his utility man, Strang, to officiate as umpire. Chance refused to appoint a man from his team to act in conjunction with Strang, saying that the game had been forfeited under the rules.

President Charles Murphy, of the Chicago club then took a hand in the much mixed proceedings and, after he had spoken a few words to Chance, the Chicago players left the grounds.

A few minutes later an announcer jumped from the grand stand and said that he had been requested by the New York club to make the following statement:

Riot Feared. Umpire Johnstone was barred from these grounds today by Police Inspector Sweeney, who feared that the presence of Johnstone, after yesterday's tumult might incite a riot.

Umpire Johnstone has declared the game forfeited by New York to Chicago, 9 to 0.

Later on the announcer again addressed the crowd, which, by this time, was scattering over the diamond to the outfield, saying:

New York Claims Game. "I am instructed by Manager McGraw to say that he, having sent Strang out as umpire and the Chicago team having ignored his calling on them to 'play ball,' the game, under the rules, is forfeited to New York, 9 to 0, and the New York club will protest the claim of the visiting club."

Rain checks had been issued prior to the game and the patrons of the club were informed that these checks would be good for any other game on these grounds during the present season.

Police Inspector Sweeney, when seen later, announced that he had not taken the initiative in preventing Umpire Johnstone from entering the grounds and added that it was at the request of the management of the New York club that he had acted as he did.

Game Goes to Chicago. Tonight the Associated Press received a dispatch from President Pulliam, of the National League dated Saratoga, N. Y., regarding the forfeited game.

President Pulliam says that the game was legally forfeited to Chicago, and that he will stand by the action of Umpire Johnstone to the finish. He adds that so long as he is president of the league he will

sustain every forfeit made where an umpire is refused admittance to any park, and that if this does not suit the league, it can have his resignation at a minute's notice.

FIST FIGHT ON DIAMOND. Boston's Manager Attacks Umpire After the Pittsburg Game.

BOSTON, MASS., Aug. 7.—Following today's National League baseball game, between Boston and Pittsburg on the South end grounds, there was a personal encounter between Manager and First Baseman Fred Tenney, of the Boston team, and Umpire Klem.

Tenney accused Klem of neglecting to deliver over to him the balls used in the game, which are always considered the property of the local clubs. He then attempted forcibly to search the umpire's pockets.

An exchange of blows followed and Klem, it is alleged, threw one of the balls at Tenney, hitting him in the face.

#### RUNNER DISOBEDIENT DISQUALIFIED

McKittridge, Who Suffered From Former Horse's Interference Comes in Second, Making Splendid Finish—Trouble at Latonia.

(By Associated Press.) SARATOGA, N. Y., Aug. 7.—McKittridge, the 3 to 2 favorite, won the Mohawk Selling Stakes, one mile and a furlong, at Saratoga today. Disobedient, at 13 to 5, who finished first, was disqualified for fouling on the first turn, by interfering with Yazd. McKittridge, who suffered by the early interference and was shut off twice, finished second, five lengths before Yazd. Three favorites won.
