HAMPTON ROOTER SHOT

Southie Lightfoot Gets Bullet
In Each Arm.

JAMES BLAND HIS ASSAILANT

Annual Battle Between Negro Football Teams of Hampton and Newport News Interrupted by a Near Tragedy—Bland Jailed.

The annual football game between the negro teams of Hampton and Newport News at Riverview Park yesterday afternoon came very near resulting in a tragedy. As the result of the affray Southie Lightfoot, better known among his acquaintances as "Southie Parker," has both arms badly fractured, while James Bland, a Newport News negro, is a prisoner in the county jail with the charge of malicious shooting, registered against him.

The contest drew the largest crowd of negroes to the park that has ever attended one of the football games.

Everything progressed very nicely until the ending of the first half, when James Bland, it is alleged, whipped out his revolver and fired five times into the crowd of Hampton rooters. Lightfoot was struck first in the left arm. The ball entered the arm at the elbow and penetrated the bone, splitting it in several places. The second shot hit Lightfoot in the right arm about three inches below the elbow and ploughed through to the fleshy part of the arm. Three shots went wild and just why some one was not killed is one of the mysteries.

According to Lightfoot a number of witnesses, Bland became angered at the manner in which Lightfoot was "rooting" for Hampton, and without the slightest intention of his intentions drew the revolver from his pocket and began firing. Bland, however, declares that Lightfoot struck him in the mouth before he began shooting.

After emptying his revolver Bland took to his heels and ran down into the swamp along Hampton Roads. Officer John West Cunningham, who was witnessing the game, started in pursuit of the fleeing man and succeeded in taking Bland into custody. Officer Cunningham experienced considerable trouble in bringing Bland to jail, owing to the intense feeling against the man. In fact Bland was pretty roughly treated by the crowd and it was all that the officer could do to keep his prisoner from severe injuries.

Bland is said to have attempted to shoot a railway conductor several years ago, and is known as a very bad man among his people.

Dr. William E. Atkins, who was also a spectator at the game, attended Southie Lightfoot. The physician found that the injuries are exceedingly dangerous.

SHIPPERS VS RAILWAYS

Battle to Finish May be Started After Next Friday.

UNIFORM BILL OF LADING CHANGES

Unless Agreement is Reached at Conference Authorized by Interstate Commerce Commission, War Will Be Declared at Once.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—An important conference called to reach an agreement on certain proposed amendments to the uniform bill of lading soon to be authorized by the Interstate Commerce Commission will be held in this city on October 11. Should the object of the meeting fail, it is said that the fight, with the railroads on the one side and the 1 1/2 shippers and bankers of the country on the other, will be waged to a finish. In this event the Interstate Commerce Commission will be the court of last resort, that body having been given full power under the new railroad rate law to prescribe the form of the new bill. Representatives of all the leading railroads, many of the prominent bankers and shippers of the country and a committee representing a large number of prominent commercial bodies have signified their intention of taking part in the conference. All the questions involved in the various amendments will be discussed, the avowed purpose of the bankers and shippers being to induce the railroads to endorse all the amendments proposed. These amendments, business men generally contend, if adopted, will remedy what they regard as the real dangers of the law in its present form which already have resulted in bankers in various sections of the country refusing to loan money on this class of collateral. The dangers of the present law, which they seek to remove by the adoption of the proposed amendments, include, according to the supporters of the new measure, loss now frequently incurred by merchants paying bills of lading drafts, by bankers making advances on bills of lading and by third parties giving advances on these instruments.

IN THE SECOND ROUND.

After making several ugly remarks to Officer Cunningham, Davis asked him whether he (the officer) was white or colored. Officer Cunningham admonished Davis that he had better go along or else he would find himself in jail.

Finally the officer took Davis in charge and when he reached the jail office the negro again became insolent and insulting. This proved a lit too much for Officer Cunningham. Before William Henry Davis could offer for the second insult the officer opened up and with three upper shots under the jaw he soon knocked the Philadelphian out. Davis, after coming back to consciousness, remarked that his face hurt him, and that the officer would be made to pay for the assault.

Mayor Thornton F. Jones will talk with Davis about his conduct in the police court this morning.

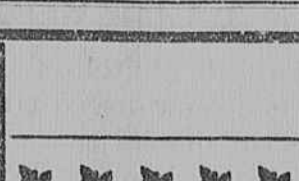

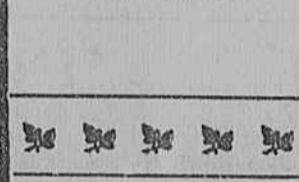
