

SOUTHERN MAN NEW MODERATOR

Rev. Mark Allison Matthews is Honored by Presbyterian General Assembly. Elected on First Ballot. Permanent Committee on Temperance Makes Its Report Public.

Louisville, Ky., May 16.—The moderatorship, the highest honor in the gift of the 15th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, in session here, went on the first ballot late today to the Rev. Mark Allison Matthews, D. D., a Southerner and pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Seattle, Wash. Out of a total of 415, Four hundred and three were necessary to elect. Other nominees and the votes cast for them were: The Rev. James G. K. McClure, president of the McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, 157; The Rev. Frank W. Sneed, D. D., of Pittsburgh, 132; and the Rev. J. Frank Smith, D. D., of Dallas, Texas, 98.

Dr. Matthews was born at Calhoun, Ga. in 1867. He was ordained in 1887. In the same year he built the first Presbyterian church in his home town. He held pastorates in Dalton, Ga., and Jackson, Tenn., moving to Washington in 1902. His Seattle congregation is said to be the largest Presbyterian congregation in the world. Dr. Matthews, who is known as the "fall pine of the strata" is six feet four inches tall and weighs less than 150 pounds. Election of the moderator overshadowed in interest only the sermon of the retiring moderator, the Rev. John P. Carson, of Brooklyn, who declared that the church is a living vital force. It has been through the ages warning that danger lies not in too little practical Christianity, but in neglect of its "spiritual functions."

Consideration of the set reports of various boards and committees of the assembly will come later in the session, though the report of the permanent committee on temperance was made public today. The committee reports that the receipts for the year were \$25,868 and the disbursements \$23,412. More than 1,000 temperance meetings have been held by representatives of the committee in twenty-eight States, and the equivalent of more than 25,000,000 pages of literature has been distributed in connection with the year's temperance campaign.

Of the consumption of liquors the report says: "Any statistics of the quantity of liquor consumed during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1911, available at this time are subject to correction when the computations of the government Bureau of Statistics are completed. The indications are that there has been a slight increase in the consumption of all kinds of liquors during the past year. The total per capita consumption exactly equals that of 1907, which was the highest in our history. The argument that the more beer that is used the less spirit will be consumed is by no means sustained by the facts. The urban districts which are under license are increasing in population much more rapidly than the rural districts, which are chiefly under prohibition. The drift of population is towards the cities. This in part explains why the consumption of liquor increases per capita while at the same time prohibition territory increases."

The committee renews its protest against the project to restore the sale of beer at the army canteen, and under the caption "Is This Anarchy?" says: "Recently the Presbyterian temperance committee had Mr. William E. Johnson make a personal investigation of the army posts at Fort Monroe, in Virginia; Fort Leavenworth and Fort Riley, in Kansas, and Fort D. Russell, in Wyoming. In every one of these places Mr. Johnson found beer being sold in open defiance of the law of Congress and the will of the people. He purchased samples of the beer and had them analyzed by capable chemists, whose certificates he holds, giving all details as to the percentage of alcohol contained, etc. In every instance the percentage was larger than the Internal Revenue Bureau permits to be sold without the payment of the beer tax, and in some instances it was several times as large. Beer is also openly sold at Fort Sheridan, near Chicago, and no doubt in other places.

"This seems to be an attempt to carry out the reported threat of the brewers—that the recreation rooms, gymnasiums, libraries, etc., secured by the temperance people from Congress at a cost of several hundred thousand dollars, would be turned into beer halls. Whoever is responsible for such conditions should be brought to justice." Most of the nominal membership of the assembly, 906, is expected by tomorrow, while members of corollary organizations and visitors have brought the attendance already to about 2,500. To-night the Lord's Supper was celebrated.

CANADIAN FARMERS TO SEE HOMEMADE TOOLS

Montreal, May 15.—A special train of ten railcars of Canadian manufacturers, chiefly farming and grain implements, started from Montreal today for an exhibition tour of Ontario and the West. The project is under the direction of the Canada Home Market Association, and its purpose is to show the farmers of Western Canada that Canadian manufacturers are fully capable of holding their own with any and all United States manufactured articles. After spending a day each in Ottawa, Toronto, Fort William and Port Arthur, the train will begin a tour that will embrace 100 of the leading cities and towns of the prairie provinces.

WILL GET CENSUS IN TWO HOURS

Whirlwind Church Campaign Will Start With Four Thousand Workers.

NINETEEN CITY DISTRICTS

All Denominations Join in Big Movement to Secure Religious Figures.

All creeds and colors will join forces on Tuesday, May 28, for the greatest undenominational religious campaign ever undertaken in the city of Richmond. In the next two hours, from 3 to 5 o'clock, 4,000 workers will make the religious census of Richmond's population in a purely undenominational manner.

The object of "Visitation Day," as it will be called, is to give a printed invitation to every person in the city to attend the Sunday school and church of individual choice and to secure a record of the church attendance of every individual, to be given to the pastor, priest or rabbi, as preferred.

The census plan is in no sense a denominational scheme. It will be no proselyting and no unseemly attempt to pry into the private affairs of the people. It is an effort, promoted by all creeds and denominations in union, to visit every home in the city on the same day, for the purpose of bringing the churches in closer touch with the people. "Visitation Day" is being promoted by the Richmond City Department of the Virginia and International Sunday School Association, with the co-operation of the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish Sunday Schools, churches and synagogues, Ministerial Association, Knights of Columbus, St. Vincent de Paul Society, Young Men's Christian Association, Young People's Societies, Men's Federated Bible Classes, Brotherhoods, the Associated Charities, social workers, etc.

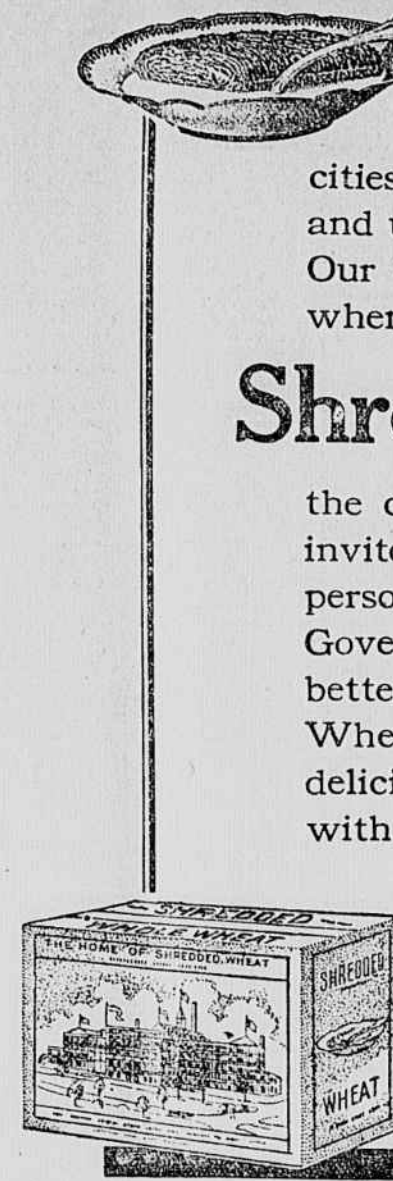
Nineteen Districts

In order to make this whirlwind canvass, the city will be divided into nineteen districts, each with superintendent. These districts will in turn be subdivided among section supervisors who will each have a zone of workers under his control. Wherever possible the workers will be made by two workers, of different denominations, who will not be assigned to a territory of more than one block.
