Clear Manufacturers Interested in Passage of Sparkman Bill. [Special to The Times-Dispatch.] Washington, May 22.—A delegation of cigar manufacturers from Tampa and Key West, Fla., interested in the passage of the Sparkman bill, which suspends the internal revenue tax on cigars and cigarette manufacturers of cigars and cigarette all over the country to-day appeared before the House Ways and Means Committee in its behalf. This bill provides among other things that a manufacturer of cigars shall be permitted to use for experimental purposes in conducting his business, and for the personal use of himself and his employees, but not for sale or profit, a number of cigars each year not exceeding 10,000. Also the total number produced in his factory, without being required to pack the same in boxes or to stamp or pay any internal revenue tax thereon. Also that every manufacturer of cigars shall put up all the cigars he manufactures in his manufactured form, and sell or removes for consumption or use, in packages or parcels containing ten, twenty, fifty, ten, or more cigars, and shall securely affix to each of such packages or parcels a suitable stamp denoting the tax thereon, and shall properly cancel the same prior to such sale or removal for consumption or use under such regulations as the Commissioner of Internal Revenue shall prescribe, and all cigars imported from a foreign country shall be packed, stamped, and cancelled in like manner. In addition to the import stamp indicating inspection of the custom house before they are withdrawn.
