ACTON FRANCHISE TO-MORROW NIGHT

Aldermen Find Many Defects in Ordinance as Now Pending.

JAMMED THROUGH COUNCIL

Street Committee at Single Session Undid Work of Many Months.

The Board of Aldermen has been called to meet to-morrow night at 8 o'clock to take up the pending light and power franchise sought by the Richmond and Henrico Railway Company.

Negro Chauffeur Pays Fine Rather Than Run Chance of Jail Sentence.

Fearing that the hearing of his case before a jury might result more seriously than he ever anticipated, Fred Robertson, colored, chauffeur for Hugh Campbell, who was fined \$10 for speeding more than a month ago and took an appeal, came to Magistrate Smith yesterday and paid the fine and cost.

When Robertson was tried, witnesses said that he was going at about thirty-five miles per hour. The judge admitted that the evidence was in doubt, and that the case was so bound up out of order that he was afraid to take the case to a jury.

The action of Magistrate Dyer yesterday, when he sentenced speeders to ten days in jail, was undoubtedly responsible for Robertson's decision. Though the jail sentence was recommended at the request of Commonwealth's Attorney, the magistrate's ruling has created a great deal of attention, and the fact that the other judges say that they will follow his course in dealing with similar cases, has resulted in something like consternation among those who are wont to drive over the county roads.
