AID TO GOOD ROADS STRUCK FROM BILL

House voted July 1 last on the date for its going into effect, believing that the appropriation bill would be passed before the close of the last fiscal year.

Another provision of the House bill, in which employees of the postal service were much interested, was that it should provide for a hearing before discharging a civil servant.

The House provisions for the promotion of seventy-five per cent of the clerks and letter carriers of first-class offices from the fifth to the sixth grade and of seventy-five per cent of the clerks and letter carriers of offices of the second class from the fourth to the fifth grade was modified by the Senate committee, to provide for the promotion of only fifty per cent.

GUARANTEES MAY BE SUSPENDED

Mexico City, July 23.—As a result of an attack on train between this city and Guernavaca three days ago and other attacks in the south as well as in the north, it was unanimously decided at Cabinet meeting today to ask the permanent commission of the Chamber of Deputies to enact a law suspending personal guarantees in several States.

Included in the districts of the States of Chiapas and Sonora, the northern part of the State of Durango and a part of Coahuila, in the north, the states of Morelos and Guerrero and parts of Mexico, Puebla and Tlaxcala, in the south. The law will be similar to that which was passed in 1904 and will amount to a state of martial law, which has surprised anything known to the public through the press.

It was also admitted that doubt was entertained as to the loyalty of several commanding officers of the Federal and State troops.
