

WAR NEWS.

A dispatch from Gen. McClellan announces a great battle before Richmond on Saturday.—The Confederates attacked the right wing of his army, on the Chickahominy, about one o'clock in the afternoon, Gen. Casey's division retreating before them, causing much confusion, during which the guns and baggage were captured by the Confederates. Gens. Heintzleman's and Kearney's division were then brought up and checked the Confederate advance, with much slaughter. Yesterday the Southern army made several attempts to renew the engagement, but were repulsed. A large number of prisoners were taken by the Federals, among them Gen. Pettigrew and Col. Long. The Federal loss is reported as heavy, and that of the Confederates is supposed to be greater.

The latest advices from Fort Pillow report the fort garrisoned by fifteen hundred artillerymen. For want of coal, the Confederates have abandoned their gunboats and taken the guns to Fulton to strengthen Fort Randolph. A pontoon bridge is being constructed across the river, to facilitate the escape of the Confederates if they should be compelled to evacuate the position.

The inland water communication between Virginia and North Carolina has been opened. A company of Gen. Burnside's troops arrived at Norfolk on Thursday, by the way of Currituck Sound and the canal. Several schooners have also passed through this route.

A dispatch from Harper's Ferry states that all was quiet there yesterday, and reports that Charlestown has been evacuated by the Confederates. The damage done to the Baltimore and Ohio railroad is represented as trifling, and can be repaired and the road put in working order in two days.

It is reported that the people of Sharpsburg, Md., and Shepardstown, Va., had a collision on Wednesday last, using an old field piece and rifles. The damage, if any, is not reported. It is said that great hostility exists between these communities.

A special dispatch to the N. Y. Times from Harper's Ferry, on Saturday, states there were no signs of the enemy there. "The 11th New York militia, a German regiment, which had arrived, refused to be sworn in, much to the disgust of their commander, Col. Maidhoffer, the men saying they wanted to go to Washington. Major Bowen, of Gen. Saxton's staff, addressed them as follows:—Those of you willing to acknowledge yourselves cowards here, in the face of the enemy, step out of the ranks. They did so, and were ordered to leave and pay their own way back to New York. But few of them remained at Harper's Ferry. Gen. Saxton rejected the whole regiment, saying that he did not want cowards in his command."

On Saturday a reconnoitering force from Gen. Banks's army entered Martinsburg, and passed several miles beyond, when a skirmish took place with some Confederate cavalry.—Several prisoners were captured, and some army stores.

The Charleston Mercury says that the steam ram Mississippi, destroyed at New Orleans by the Confederates, was three times as large as the Merrimac.

The point to which the Confederate army has retired from Corinth, is not yet ascertained.

A bill has been introduced into the U. States Senate "to punish those who may burn or destroy vessels on the high seas belonging to the citizens of the United States."
