LATEST WAR NEWS.

[FROM THE ASSOCIATED PRESS.]

WASHINGTON, July 4.—The Richmond Examiner, of July 2d, gives the following items relating to the battle of Monday:

"Sunday morning, Hill and Longstreet, with their divisions, crossed the Chickahominy, and late Monday afternoon attacked the enemy about five miles northeast of Darbytown, on the New Market road. The conflict was terrible, and by half-past eight o'clock, P. M., the enemy had been driven back a mile and a half. At half-past nine, being heavily reinforced, the enemy made another stand.

"The loss here on our side was terrible. The situation being evidently hopeless against such overwhelming forces, Gen. Hill slowly retreated. At this moment, seeing their adversary retire, the most vociferous cheers arose along the whole Yankee line. The fight ended then for the night."

The Examiner says, it thinks the division, which went into the fight of Friday 14,000 strong, could only muster six thousand men for duty on Tuesday, and that the loss of life exceeds that of any battle or series of battles yet fought. About eight o'clock, A. M., Tuesday, Jackson and Huger's divisions attacked McClellan's left flank on the west side of the Chickahominy, seventeen miles from Richmond. Later in the day, Magruder fell upon the right flank. Fighting was going on up to nine o'clock Tuesday night. Heavy firing from the gunboats on James river was heard Tuesday morning.—A number of Federal transports are in the river with reinforcements, supposed from Burnside, but they had not yet landed."

The above extracts from the Examiner relate to Tuesday's battle, in which Gen. McClellan's dispatch of yesterday said the enemy were badly beaten.

Advices received at the War Department show that there was no fighting on the Peninsula, on Wednesday or Thursday up to 5.30, P. M. E. S. SANFORD, M. S.

WAR DEPARTMENT, WASHINGTON, July 4.—The latest advices, received at the War Department from Gen. McClellan's army are dated nine o'clock this morning up to which time there had been no fighting since Tuesday.

Gen. Dix reports the arrival at Fortress Monroe of 523 Confederate prisoners, being a part of those taken during the late battles. Among them are several Colonels and Majors. Gen. Dix has ordered all civilians away from Fortress Monroe, and no person will be permitted to pass to that point, or the Army of the Potomac, except those connected with the military or naval service of the United States.

THE LATEST FROM GEN. McCLELLAN.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Dispatches were this morning received at the War Department from Gen. McClellan, dated yesterday afternoon.—He says there had been no fighting since Tuesday, when our troops were victorious; that all the men under his command fought well, that the sick and wounded are being sent to hospitals, and that yesterday, the day was celebrated by a review of the troops, the playing of national airs, etc., and that all things wear

a bright appearance. His flank is protected by seventeen gunboats. He says the U. S. forces have not been defeated, and that the guns lost were when the onslaught was made upon McCall, on Friday.

SICK AND WOUNDED SOLDIERS.

WASHINGTON, July 5.—About twelve hundred sick and wounded soldiers arrived here yesterday from James river, and were conveyed to the different hospitals. More are expected to arrive to-day.

Captain Keller, of the schooner Levi Rowe, at New York from Nassau, N. P., reports that on the 15th of June, when he sailed, there were nine steamships in port, three or four of which were freighted with war material from England, destined for Charleston, S. C. The remainder had run into Nassau from Charleston, so that, in fact, a brisk foreign trade was carried on through this channel with South Carolina.

The Senate bill to confiscate the property of Confederates for the expenses of the present war, and for other purposes, was rejected in the House of Representatives on Thursday, by a vote of 8 yeas to 123 nays.

The Wheeling Press says:—"On Tuesday, Governor Pierpont and attorney General Wheat were duly qualified to hold their respective offices for the second term for which they were recently elected. Oath was administered to them by the Secretary of State, L. A. Hagans, Esq."
