Latest from Europe.

ST. JOHNS, July 8.—The latest advices from Liverpool reported a great increase of excitement in cotton rates. The prices are $\frac{1}{2}$ to a penny higher than the official figures on Friday.

LONDON, Saturday.—Consols selling for money from 91 $\frac{1}{2}$ to 91 $\frac{1}{4}$.

MADRID, June 27.—In Senate to-day, Calderon Collantes expressed the hope that the action of France in Mexico would not exceed the limits of the London convention. The ministers have said that Spain would still exercise sufficient influence to obtain legislative satisfaction from Mexico, for she had not abandoned the necessary means.

It is positively affirmed that the King of Portugal is betrothed to the Princess of Savoy.

LOCAL.—Yesterday afternoon, after the warmest day, so far, of the Summer, heavy clouds gathered, and there was a refreshing rain, accompanied with a high wind, and much lightning and thunder; the weather to-day continued sultry.—Early this morning a man entered the yard of a citizen of the First Ward, and stole his chickens; before he could be arrested he made off, but the chickens were recovered.—Yesterday, about 1 o'clock, four men, not citizens of this place, went through some of the streets in the First Ward, knocking down, and injuring colored persons; they seized two negroes near the First Presbyterian church, and beat them severely.—It is said that the question raised as to the fines imposed upon jurors in this county for not taking the oath required, is to be further adjudicated upon appeal.—There is the prospect, we are told, of having an additional supply of ice here—much wanted, indeed—as the present supply is small, the price high, and the demand large.—The Thermometer, in the shade, this day at 12 o'clock, stood at 89°.

Recently Earl Essex, walking in some street in London, saw a coachman cruelly beating one of his horses, and caused his arrest. The noble Earl went to the police court and testified to the extreme cruelty of the man, who was fined; whereupon it turned out that the coachman was whipping the beast by order of a "noble lady" (!) who was in the coach. She even came to the rescue of the driver, and so the fine was transferred to her, whereupon her brother threatened to horsewhip the Earl.

Upon the call by the President for 300,000 additional troops, Col. Frank P. Blair, Chairman of the Military Committee of the House of Representatives, was requested to proceed at once to Missouri to raise a brigade.

The New York World says:—"The governments of France and England know that intervention means war, and that war with the United States would not pay expenses. The recent check to the Federal arms on the peninsula may embolden the two governments to take some action inimical to the U. S. government, but it is not their present intention to venture upon armed intervention.

The Nashville letter of the Philadelphia Press, dated July 1, says:—"In a short time, you will probably hear of events of interest in East Tennessee. The entrance of a portion of the Federal army into Cumberland Gap is of no great importance. The Confederates have retreated to a large hill called Clinch mountain, and Cumberland Gap are three rivers—Powell's, Clinch and Holston rivers. The fortifications which the Confederates are erecting upon the mountain will command the three rivers; thus nothing important has been gained. Gen. Morgan dare not attempt a flank movement, as the Confederates would cross to Cumberland Gap and cut off his supplies. If he could succeed in driving the Confederates from Clinch mountain, and get possession of the East Tennessee and Virginia railroad, access to Knoxville would be easy."
