

QUARTERLY COURT.—Pursuant to adjournment, the Court re-assembled this morning.—Robt. Crupper, P. J.; Lewis McKenzie, J. C. McCracken, and C. W. Noland, on the bench. The Grand Jury, except H. S. Martin, and J. T. Evans appeared in Court. J. T. Close and J. M. Stewart, were qualified in the place of the absentees. After a short absence the jury returned into Court, and having no presentments to make, were adjourned until Tuesday next.

T. J. Mehaffey presented an excuse for failure to appear as summoned, as a Grand Juror, and the fine imposed upon him was remitted on payment of costs.

A fine was imposed upon John Jones, Benj. Hughes, John Thompson, Gibson Peach, R. H. Rudd, John Arnold, Gilbert Simpson, Jas. Fadley, W. N. Brown, S. O. Baggett, U. W. Barker, Wm. Bartle, W. H. Muir, J. J. Wheat, Robt. Snyder, and M. German, each, of \$8, for contempt, in not qualifying as Grand Jurors. Alfred More was excused from the fine on a plea of non residence, and H. Wilburn was excused, he not being a freeholder.

Mrs. Caroline M. Johnson appeared and qualified, and gave bond as administratrix of J. T. Johnson deceased.

The following were fined for failure to qualify as Petit Jurors: J. P. Emerson and Jos. Cawood \$4 each, and Geo. McBurney, O. Nugent, D. O. Sullivan and L. Brill, \$8 each.

Wm. Ives, colored, was granted permission to keep an eating house.

The following civil cases were disposed of.

Earle & Co., vs. T. A. Brewis—jury and damages for plaintiff, assessed at \$642,65 with interest from July 4, 1862.

W. G. Lewis & Son, vs. Barley, Triplett & Co—judgment for plaintiff and damages assessed at \$258,17, with interest from September 5, 1861.

Graham, vs. Cregan—unlawful detainer—judgment for plaintiff. Several cases were continued, and some dismissed.

Licenses were granted to J. T. Cooke; Jos. Broadus, and J. C. McCracken to retail liquors, and to—Vangpan, R. Fenton, D. O. Sullivan, L. Shenfield, M. McDevett, and John Crawford, to keep ordinaries.

A number of accounts were presented, and certified for payment.

The County Levy was adjourned till September term.

The petit jury was adjourned till Tuesday, and the court adjourned till Tuesday, at 10 o'clock.

John W. Brown, of Greenville, Orange county, N. Y., having advertised his wife for "leaving his bed and board without just cause or provocation," and forbidding "all persons to harbor or trust her on his account," receives the following answer to his card, through the papers:

THE CHINESE REBELLION.—It is now full thirteen years since the rebellion first showed its head in the vicinity of Canton. The Coolie boy whom Father Roberts taught and meant to Christianize, has become the Mahommed of 1862, and dictates to hordes of followers. It is believed that there are in all the Provinces at least one million of armed men enrolled under his banners. They are led in different directions to the four points of the compass, under four General Chiefs, styled Northern King, Eastern King, Southern King, Western King, and have overrun three-fourths of the heart of China, having a population of some eighty millions of souls. They have taken and sacked, among others, the old and wealthy cities of Soo Choo, Ningpo and Hangehow. They have laid under heavy contribution of life and property hundreds of villages and thousands of hamlets, and with fire and knife desolated the country. It is usual for them to kill the old people and the young children, and press into their service the middle aged of both sexes.—They are courageous and cruelly vindictive, and having been engaged so long in this business of war, they now have no inclination to return to the honest avocations of peace.

The guns, &c. from the Norfolk Navy Yard, which have been brought up by the schooners W. P. Cox and Deborah, have all been landed, and are being arranged along the wharves at the Washington Navy Yard.
