

CITY MARKET.—The market was well supplied this morning with Meats, Vegetables and Fruits. The price of Meats is unchanged.—Vegetables are lower—Green Corn, 15@20 cts. a dozen; Irish Potatoes, 25@37½ cts. a peck; Tomatoes, 20@25 cts. a peck; Cymbalings, 12 cts. a dozen; Watermelons and Cantaloupes are scarce and high—Watermelons 20@25 cts. a piece; for small sized Cantaloupes 5@20 cents a piece; Eggs, 25 cents a dozen; Butter 25@28 cents a pound for print; Rock, Tailors, and Catfish were in fair supply; Rock and Tailors selling at 28 cents a bunch; Catfish 15@20 cents a bunch.

LOCAL.—We learn that there are in the hospitals in this city 1,100 wounded and sick soldiers from Gen. Pope's command.—Lieut. Frederick Potter, of Pate's battalion, of the Confederate Army, who was captured on the Peninsula, has been paroled, and is on a visit to his family in this city.—Mosquitoes, for the past few nights have been very annoying; they have appeared in great numbers in all parts of the town.—There has been a very agreeable change in the weather.

CONFEDERATE STRENGTH.—The Harrison Landing correspondent of the Philadelphia Inquirer learning from released federal officers that "the strength and present disposition of the Confederate forces at or near Richmond is, that within a radius of a hundred miles they have at least two hundred and fifty to two hundred and eighty thousand troops. Some three or four days after their incarceration at the Eighteenth street prison, they saw marching through Main street a body of troops, some forty to fifty regiments, all fully armed and equipped. They were told that this body was sent out to strengthen Jackson and Longstreet, who are opposing Generals Pope and Banks."

The following despatch has been sent to Gen. Pope by General Halleck:

To Major General Pope.—your telegram of last evening is most satisfactory, and I congratulate you and your army, and particularly General Banks and his corps, on your hard earned but brilliant success against vastly superior numbers. Your troops have covered themselves with glory; and Cedar Mountain will be known in history as one of the great battle-fields of the war.

The Movement of the Army of the Potomac.
The Harrison's Landing correspondent of the New York Times, writing on the 13th, says:

The movement for withdrawing the army from the James river, which began nearly a week ago, very quietly, has steadily progressed until each officer and man stands ready for the word to march. The effort to retire without knowledge of the enemy I think has failed.—The unusual massing of vessels and transports near the various landings, side by side; the industry of the small tugs moving vessels about; the accumulation of the larger transports opposite camp, and the filling of the mailboat for 3 days past with troops, to say nothing of the departure of steamers during every night for most of the past week, must have attracted attention, even if the other movements immediately upon the encampment and along the banks have not been observed from a hundred places on the opposite shore, which it has been impossible for us to occupy or guard.

A large number of the troops have been sent from here by transports. Seymour's division, or a part of it, as well as a part of Heintzelman's have already gone—the second brigade of Seymour's to report directly to General Burnside, at Aquia Creek. We shall have profitable reduction in the length of our retreating column, as well as in its strength. The best that can be done, using all the transports to be had, the body of troops and material to be moved will be immense. It will form a cavalcade or train of at least sixteen or twenty miles.

Surplus tents have already been struck; regimental baggage, by the hundred tons, has been shipped, and eight days' rations ordered for each of the commands—five days to go on the transports, land and water, and three to be carried by the men.

The orders to march, or what is equivalent to it, were issued on Sunday. They were countermanded, or the time extended, on Monday. So that while the preparations have been going steadily on the army has been on the qui vive ever since, expecting to move every hour. Some of the batteries, it is said, have had their horses harnessed for forty-eight hours.
