

Orders have been issued by the War Department to Provost Marshal General Draper, United States Marshal Murray, and General Superintendent Kennedy, of New York, to take measures to prevent men from voting who have claimed exemption from the draft on account of being aliens. Accordingly the names of all such persons will be at the polls, and the moment one attempts to vote, he will be arrested, and held subject to the decision of the Government.

Southern papers state that Gen. Butler's recent visit to Pensacola had reference to an advance on the Mobile and Montgomery railroad. Seven thousand troops, it is reported, landed at Pensacola with the general.

The bark Young Turk, arrived at New York, reports seeing the light of a burning vessel at sea, but fearing it was the work of the steamer "290," did not go to her assistance.

The Richmond papers announce the arrival in that city of General Bragg and his staff.

The fulfillment of the contracts with the U. S. Navy Department for the construction and machinery of some of the new screw sloops-of-war, has been delayed much beyond the time specified.

The Sheriff of Anne Arundel county, Md., yesterday took possession of the steamer Champion, on her down trip, and placing an armed posse on board, proceeded in pursuit of a fleet of oyster boats from Philadelphia, engaged in dredging for oysters, contrary to the laws. On discovering the purpose of the expedition they hoisted sail, and took to flight, but six of them were overtaken and captured, and brought into Annapolis.

Files from the British West Indies, dated at Bermuda to the 21st of October, have been received. The inhabitants of the islands were greatly excited against the action of Admiral Wilkes, United States Navy, in his watch of the Confederate traders and cruisers. The people of Bermuda term it a "blockade" of British territory by American vessels-of-war.

Gov. Pierpont has received the following dispatch:—"The notorious guerilla Sam High, of Hampshire, was killed to-day and his band dispersed. He belonged to Imboden's Partisan Rangers."

It is said that in consequence of the great rise in the commodity of paper, persons who have contracted to furnish the Government with supplies of that article will be compelled to throw up their contracts, and thus forfeit their bonds, unless some provision be made by Congress for their relief. The rise in the price of paper within the last few weeks has been unprecedented.

Parson Brownlow, after another appeal on behalf of the suffering Union men of East Tennessee, concludes as follows:—"I have canvassed the entire North in defence of the Union cause, and in vindication of the present Administration, and I now propose to re-canvass the whole, in order to expose the villainy of its army officers, paymasters, swindlers and upstarts who are eating up the substance of the Government."
