FROM HAVANA.

NEW YORK, Dec. 22.—The steamship Union has arrived from Havana on the 15th. She left the U. S. steamers Wachusett and Sonora, of Wilke's squadron, at that port, are all well on board.

There is no later news from Mexico. The new Captain General Dulce has arrived at Havana.

General Zerrono has left for Spain. The Southern population entertained accompanying him to the entrance of the harbor in the steamers, but he requested them not, and Gen. Dulce forbade it.

There is still forty thousand bags of old crop sugar on hand.

Unusually heavy rains have retarded and impaired the new crop which will be small.

There has been no arrival of Confederate vessels save two with cotton, one of which was from Matamoros.

FROM NORTH CAROLINA.

NASHVILLE, Dec. 21.—The Chattanooga dai- Rebel of Tuesday, the 18th instant, contains the following:

WILMINGTON, N. C. Dec. 17.—General Gustavus Smith is being heavily reinforced at Goldsboro'. There was heavy fighting there yesterday, in which the enemy were repulsed with heavy loss. Our loss (Confederate) was small.

FROM TENNESSEE.

NASHVILLE, Dec. 21.—Yesterday Gen. Van Doves had a brisk skirmish with the enemy, the Confederate cavalry force supported by our pieces or artillery, reconnoitred Gen. Van Doves's pontoon, but were driven off after the exchange of a few shots.

Confirmation has been received of the report of the reinforcement of the Confederates by Gen. Van Dorn.

The Richmond papers of the 17th inst., announce editorially the retreat of the Federal army from Fredericksburg in comments upon the telegraphic despatches of General Lee. The Whig ridicules this retreat. The papers claim the fight at Fredericksburg as the greatest victory yet gained by the Confederates. They state that "the repulse of the Federals exceeded that of the old Bull run." They say that their position back of Fredericksburg is impregnable, and that they can remain in that position as long as the Federal forces can maintain their ground on the North side of the river.

The vessels of the Banks expedition are unfortunate. Another one, making in all about that compelled to seek shelter in an unseaworthy condition, has been barely saved from destruction by the aid of the bark Gemsbock and transport Blackstone.

Rev. Dr. McPheeters, of St. Louis has been ordered by the provost marshal general to leave the State within ten days "for encouraging rebellion and sustaining disloyalty in his church." Three members of the church have been appointed trustees, and directed to fill the church with a loyal man."

The New York Herald publishes the details of the capture of Kingston, N. C., and says that Foster is marching upon Goldsboro'. It urges the Government to send reinforcements to enable him to maintain his position, as the Confederates can be reinforced from Fredericksburg, the disaster to Burnside relieving them from duty on the Rappahannock.

The guard at the Alexandria Ferry have recently stopped several persons with forged passes.

The U. S. government have adopted the policy of paroling Confederate prisoners, "not to leave loyal States during the war."

The Jewish Messenger contains a letter, written from Jerusalem, November 7th, announcing the death of the Chief Rabbi of Palestine.

The Washington Republican says: "The productive results of the draft in Maryland are not reported very favorably upon. It is said that a good many of the men drafted, have made good their escape into Dixie, preferring to fight under Jeff. Davis."
