

The average weekly receipts at the Bureau of Internal Revenue are about one million and a half of dollars. A great many districts where taxes have been collected have not yet been heard from. The greatest amount received in one day has been \$450,000, and when matters shall have become systematized, the receipts are expected to foot up \$3,000,000 a week.

It is stated in the National Intelligencer that since the first of the present month 3,486 disabled soldiers have been discharged from the hospitals in this vicinity, and 732 have been furloughed.

The Washington Chronicle has a long article devoted to the National Intelligencer and its course, charging upon that paper that it is not impartial, dignified or loyal.

The Legislature of New York, have adopted resolutions in favor of adopting measures to decrease the present price of paper.

The New York legislature is to elect a United States Senator, next Tuesday, to succeed Hon. Preston King.

The news of the destruction of four more Northern vessels by the Confederate steamer Oreto (or the Florida, as she is now called) has created a profound sensation in New York especially among the shipping merchants.

It is not expected that Judge Brent will hold court at Marlboro', Md., on Monday.

The express train from Easton, Pennsylvania, on the Jersey railroad, collided with the coal train yesterday. Both engines were smashed, and six passengers seriously injured.

The schooner Gipsey, from Kingston, Jamaica, reports Jan. 25th, latitude 35, longitude 74.30, she passed a large screw steamer of war, bark rigged, painted black, steering south, supposed to be the Alabama, as she did not show her colors. She was pierced for about sixteen guns, and passed within two miles of the Gipsy.

General Butler has arrived in Washington, where he has been called by orders from the U. S. War Department.

The U. S. Navy Department has intelligence that one hundred and ten prisoners were taken with the Harriet Lane.

In the Legislature of New Jersey, a resolution has been offered asking for the restoration of Gen. McClellan as Commander-in-chief, and expressing the belief, that he only can remedy existing evils.

Mr. Boileau, editor of the Philadelphia Journal, recently arrested in that city, has been sent to Fortress McHenry, near Baltimore.

Rev. Mr. Landstreet recently captured and taken to Washington, is there on parole.

Mr. Foote, in the Confederate Senate, has introduced a series of resolutions stating the conditions on which the Confederate States would consent to negotiate for peace—the foundation of which is the recognition of their independence.

A fire recently occurred in Fredericksburg, accidentally, which burned down several houses.

No court martial in the case of Gen. Stone, U. S. A., has yet been called.

It is said immense speculations are now being made in Pennsylvania coal lands.

Robert Dale Owen has been appointed to a clerkship in the U. S. War Department.
