

FROM WASHINGTON.

[Dispatches to the Philadelphia Inquirer.]

WASHINGTON, March 17.—One-year Certificates of Indebtedness which are now falling due should be sent into the Treasury at once, where they will be promptly paid in gold. Interest accruing after maturity will not be paid.

Hon. Joseph J. Lewis, newly appointed Commissioner of Internal Revenue, entered upon his duties to-day. Sayles I. Bowen, Chief Clerk of the Senate, has been appointed city Postmaster here vice Clephane removed, to take effect on the 1st of April.

Reports brought by the last steamer from Europe of the intention of Napoleon to withdraw the French army from Mexico, are discredited in diplomatic circles. It is stated by those who are most familiar with the Emperor's designs that the French army in Mexico will be largely augmented, as he contemplates a vigorous campaign in the next ninety days. Such are also the advices in possession of our Government.

Secretary Seward gives a grand dinner this evening to the corps diplomatique. The Haytian Minister is present, together with a few distinguished strangers and Senators.

General Burnside, having been assigned to his new Department, will at once assume command. General Parke accompanies him.

General Cadwalader has been assigned to the command of the Second Corps, Army of the Potomac.

Up to this evening no official information has been received here by the Government in regard to affairs at Vicksburg. Reports of captures in Yazoo River, by our forces, are believed by Government officials.

It is believed that the President will reappoint Judge Wiley, whose nomination as Judge of the Supreme Court of this district was rejected by the Senate, on account of threats made by him against Senator Trumbull.

The New York Herald's army correspondent, named Denys was arrested yesterday by General Hooker's orders, for publishing contraband news in that paper. He is now in confinement at Aquia Creek, and will probably be tried by court-martial.

Mr. Vallandigham, M. C., from the Dayton District, arrived home last Monday, and, although but two days' notice was had of his coming, received one of the greatest ovations ever given to any man in Ohio.

Chief Justice Carter and Justices Olin and Fisher have been sworn in under the act reorganizing the courts of the District of Columbia. The President has not yet designated who shall be the successor of Andrew Wylie, whom the Senate failed to confirm at its extra session. It is understood that the matter will be settled by the President within the next few days.

Captain Baptist Mezick, who died on Sunday last at his farm, Sandy Point, on the Chesapeake Bay, was once a valued citizen of Baltimore. Some thirty years ago he retired to his farm at Sandy Point, where he died at the advanced age of ninety years.

The Bark Benefactor, recently arrived from Japan, brings, besides a valuable cargo of Japanese goods, an order from the Tycoon for the construction of three large steamers.

Another list of delinquent officers has been reported by the War Department, all of whom will be dismissed from the service unless they appear within fifteen days before the Commissioner at Washington.

The steamer, Champion, bringing the California mails and passengers, and a quarter of a million of dollars in gold, arrived at New York yesterday.

At Fortress Monroe, March 16, the steamer State of Maine arrived from Washington, with 310 prisoners, mostly citizens, to be sent within the Confederate lines. She left for City Point.

The New York Tribune, in a discussion on the Emancipation Proclamation says that President Lincoln, by that proclamation "has not assumed to abolish the laws of any State," inasmuch that the "loyal blacks" of Georgia, even if actually liberated under the operation of the "edict of freedom," as enforced by the Federal armies, could none the less be lawfully reduced to slavery again, at the close of the war.

The Secretary of the Treasury is increasing to a considerable extent the naval department of his branch of the service.
