**LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.**

NEW YORK, April 1st.—The very latest, per steamer City of Washington, an important engagement on the 16th at Londick, Poland. The Russian troops were compelled to retreat after burning the town. The force of the insurgents amounted to 3,000, and reinforcements have been sent forward.

The Persian sultan is about to visit Egypt. The Polish Prince Constantine Czartoryski is on his way to Stockholm, and has received a most enthusiastic reception in all the Swedish cities he passed through.

Intelligence from Japan announces the degradation of the nobles who have been connected with foreigners. This measure is supposed to be the precursor of repudiation of all treaties with foreign powers.

**GOLD AGAIN ADVANCING.**

NEW YORK, April 1.—Gold opened this morning at 158.

The Washington Chronicle says:—"We have been permitted to see a private letter, received by a gentleman in this city, from a correspondent in Nassau, which states that, on an average, two vessels a day arrive in that place loaded with cotton. By some means they contrive to run the blockade."
