

COUNTY COURT.—At a county court held for this county to-day, there were present, on the bench W. L. Penn, W. N. Berkley, J. T. Taylor and Joo. Moore. W. L. Penn was appointed presiding justice, pro tem.

The following conveyances admitted to record since the last term of the court were ordered to be entered on the minutes.—E. Wheeler et als. to C. W. Nowland, bargain and sale, dated April 28 1863; C. W. Nowland and wife to R. Johnston, deed of trust for the benefit of Joseph Chauncey, dat d April 28 1853; R. G. Violet and wife to Mary E. Hoy deed of bargain and sale, dated Feb. 12th 1863.

Administration, with will annexed of Rev. E. Harrison, deceased, was granted to Thomas McCormick who qualified and gave bond. Vorhees & Bell vs. Weeks—dismissed.—The County levy was adjourned till the next court.

The apprisment on the estates of Ann Solomon and J. C. Hammerdinger deed. were returned to Court.

Persons having claims against the county were ordered to present them at the next term of the Court.

THE EXPEDITION UP THE YAZOO.

The following telegram was received at the Navy Department yesterday:

FLAGSHIP BLACK HAWK, MISSISSIPPI SQUADRON, NEAR VICKSBURG, May 25, VIA CAIRO, May 30.—Hon. Gideon Welles, Secretary of the Navy—SIR: I have the honor to inform you that the expedition I sent up the Yazoo, under command of Lieutenant Commander Walker, after taking possession of the forts at Haine's Bluff, as perfectly successful. Three powerful steamer rams were destroyed at Yazoo City, one a monster three hundred and ten feet long, seventy feet beam, to be covered with four-inch iron plates.

A fine navy-yard, with machine shops of all kinds, saw mills, blacksmith shops, &c., were burned up. The property destroyed and captured amounted to over two millions of dollars. Had the monster ram been finished she would have given us some trouble. One battery was destroyed at Crury Bluff. Our loss on the expedition was one killed and seven wounded.

MOVEMENTS IN THE FRONT.

WASHINGTON, May 30.—Gentleman who arrived here to-night from the Rappahannock, say that large columns of the enemy are in motion, and were traced yesterday by the lines of dust on the rear of their river front, where one considerable body was moving southward. The preponderance of masses appeared to be going in the direction of Kelly's Ford and Culpeper. The Rebel infantry guard at Banks, United States and Kelly's Fords has been considerably increased within the past day or two which is construed in some quarters as a ruse to cover the movement of a raid by Stuart via Cupper.

Gov. Blair of Michigan paid a visit to Gen. Hooker yesterday, accompanied by several ladies and gentleman. They were courteously and warmly received by the General.

It is believed that the enemy are preparing to demonstrate somewhere on our line. The movement upon the other side may be only a ruse to draw attention from some other point.

The Captain of the ship Caravan from London, reports that on the 10th inst., at midnight, when in latitude 46.30, longitude 46, he ran into a field of ice; he wore ship and stood southeast, with a view of getting clear, but at daylight found his ship completely surrounded by icebergs. He continued to run in a southeasterly direction for 48 hours, but was still unable to get clear. Finally, however, on the 16th he escaped, having been entirely surrounded by the ice-fields during the whole six days. He passed the last of the icebergs in latitude 44.30, longitude 51.30

The Washington correspondent of the N. Y. Tribune says:—"The order containing the findings and sentence in the case of Col. D'Utassy is in the hands of the printer, and will be published in a day or two. The sentence which is understood to be degradation from rank, deprivation of back pay, disqualified from holding any office of trust or honor, and one years imprisonment at hard labor, has been approved, and Sing Sing penitentiary has been designated as the place of confinement. Col. D'Utassy, who is now in the Old Capitol prison, has been found guilty of many of the offences charged, including that of selling appointments to officers, selling Government horses, and swearing to and collecting a false and fraudulent recruiting account against the United States for \$3,255."

The Free South, at Port Royal, S. C., says, "General Saxton has issued a circular reducing the ration given to negroes in this department. He orders that the ration shall be altogether discontinued, except in cases where to do so would be manifestly inhuman. The ration consists of three-fourths of a pound of bread and a little salt. In the case of aged and sick persons, molasses and meat will be added. This question of rations has been a vexatious one from the beginning. In addition to the evil of expense, it has fostered the idea very generally entertained by the negroes, that the Government is bound to support them."

Intelligence from Utah up to the 10th instant has been received. The grand jury for the United States District Court adjourned without taking any action in the matter of Brigham Young's arrest for polygamy; the whole subject was treated as a matter for jest. A considerable number of "Morrissites" (schismatics) have left Salt Lake for Idaho, anxious to escape from the despotism of Brigham, who is represented as persecuting them severely.

Mexican news via San Francisco is to the 6th inst. At that time the bombardment of Puebla was still progressing, but according to the report the French were expected soon to raise the siege. General Comenfort was about to make an important flank movement which would compel the besieging forces to retire still further from the city.

Colonel Chester Harding, Jr., commanding the St. Joseph (Missouri) district, has ordered the arrest of all Southern sympathizers. He says that it is the duty of every loyal man to do something for his Government.
