

LATER FROM HARRISBURG.

HARRISBURG, June 18—9 o'clock.—The Delegates to the National Democratic State Convention are now assembling. No news has been received from the Confederates up to this time. Troops have commenced arriving in this city. Miller's Philadelphia battery has reached here.

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Mr. Norton, the agent of the Pennsylvania central railroad in this city, at 10 o'clock this morning received the following dispatch:—"No news. Road all night. Trains running regularly." This indicates that the Confederates have not yet made their appearance about Harrisburg, for they would certainly stop travel over the Pennsylvania Central.

The Star says:—"We have reason to believe, further, that information has reached here indicating that the Confederates are already on the back track to leave the State with their booty. There seems to be no doubt that the raiding party consists of only some 2,500 of Jenkins' Western Virginia cavalry."

FROM NEW YORK.

[Correspondence of the Philadelphia Inquirer.]

NEW YORK, June 16.—Contrary to general expectation this morning, no troops have left this city to-day for the border, but it is understood that the Seventh Regiment will be off by 7 o'clock to-morrow morning, an effort will be made to send on other regiments as rapidly as possible. The various armories to-day exhibit a busy scene, and communications by telegraph are frequently passing between the State military authorities at Albany and those of this city. Both are understood to be acting together in perfect harmony. This is as it should be.

The Seventy-first Regiment will probably leave in the course of to-night. The Sixty-ninth is actively recruiting at Essex Market and will endeavor to be off to-morrow. The Thirty-seventh ditto. General Wool is taking measures to forward a large force of regulars from Governor's Island. In short, everything that can be done will be done by the State, City and Federal authorities, to hurry on every man and every gun that can be got. It is probable also, that a mass meeting of citizens will be held to-morrow, to facilitate the good work.

The public mind is wonderfully calm under the circumstances, and the Stock Exchange, usually so sensitive at times, is scarcely affected by the frequent alarming despatches that are read to the members. Government securities are all firm.

FROM HARRISBURG.

HARRISBURG, June 16.—The following dispatch was received at 1 o'clock this afternoon, from the operator at London, Franklin county: The Federal pickets brought in a prisoner this morning who reports the Confederates in heavy force in Cumberland Valley.

The Bedford office reports that a scout has just come in who says the Confederates are moving on Cumberland with a force of six thousand cavalry. There are no Union troops there to resist them. The citizens are leaving.

HARRISBURG, June 16.—The Pennsylvanians are flocking to the State defence. Every county has responded and troops are now being forwarded in great numbers from all points.

Lancaster is the first to send her five hundred men. Two regiments are expected to-night from Reading. The One-hundred and twenty-seventh, Col. Jennings, has reorganized, and is now armed. It is the first militia armed troops in the intrenchments.

NEW YORK, June 17.—The steamer Arago, from Port Royal on the 14th, has arrived.—She brings mails and four hundred passengers. Among the latter are Gen. Hunter and staff.

The privateer Tacony, or Florida No. 2, was seen on the morning of the 14th, just outside of the Capes of the Delaware.

FROM PORT HUDSON.

PHILADELPHIA, JUNE 16.—Advices per the steamer Fulton state a telegram received at New Orleans on the morning of the 7th inst. announces the commencement of the bombardment of Port Hudson at 2 o'clock on the morning of that day. Contrary to the formerly expressed hopeful condition of Brigadier General Sherman, he is now in a critical condition, his leg having been amputated. The hospitals at Baton Rouge are filled to overflowing with sick and wounded from Port Hudson, and it is feared the extreme heat may prove fatal to many of them. All the troops with the exception of three regiments have been withdrawn from the Teche country and sent to Port Hudson. The river is falling fast and therefore some of the heavy draft vessels will be obliged to come lower down.

 A. Can't say.  
 Q. What is the letter of your company?  
 A. Got no letters.  
 Q. To what corps do you belong?  
 A. Don't belong to any.  
 Q. What were you doing in Chambersburg?  
 A. Looking around.  
 Q. Your name?  
 A. Got none.

 WHEREAS the condition of the city of Alexandria is such, that, unless active steps are taken to insure a proper observance of sanitary rules, the health of the people of the city, and of the troops in the hospitals and neighborhood, will materially suffer, and it appearing that the civil authorities have not the means of placing the city in a proper sanitary condition: Therefore, by virtue of the authority vested in the undersigned, notice is hereby given to all persons owning, residing in, or having the use of any residence, stable, outhouse, or premises, of any description whatsoever, that they are required to have the same thoroughly cleaned in four days from this date of all garbage, manure, &c., &c., the same to be placed in a pile in the centre of the street, or in barrels, before their premises. After the first four days, it will be continued by them from day to day. All persons upon whose premises more than one cart load has accumulated, will be required to remove it at their own expense. All persons failing to comply with this order, will be brought before the Provost Judge, and fined.
