

REPORTS FROM GEN. LEE'S ARMY.

[Correspondence of the Phila. Inquirer.]
HARRISBURG, July 24.—No information whatever has been received here to confirm the rumored advance of Lee across the Potomac.

BALTIMORE, July 24.—The rumors of Gen. Lee's return into Maryland are entirely unfounded. Trains now run regularly to Harper's Ferry, and if any such movement had been made it would certainly be known here.

NEW YORK, July 24.—A special despatch from Washington says:—"It has been definitely ascertained that Lee's army is at Winchester, and has made no general advance down the Valley.

CHAMBERSBURG, July 24.—A tried Union man, who came from Bunker Hill to-day, says that Lee and Staff reached Strasburg. The advance of the retreating Confederates reached Mount Jackson day before yesterday. There has been no fighting at Front Royal as reported to have occurred yesterday.

From the Army of the Cumberland.

HEAD-QUARTERS McCOOK'S CORPS,
WINCHESTER, Penn., July 18, 1863

The report of the taking of Huntsville, Alabama, by Major General Stanley, is confirmed. He entered that city yesterday morning without opposition. He had captured some six hundred horses, two hundred of them having contraband riders.

General Bragg's army is very much reduced by desertion, and is supposed to contain about 18,000 or 20,000 men at present.

General Rosecrans is on a visit to Nashville, where he was received with great enthusiasm, as I learn. He has his Staff with him.

General Gordon Granger is now Commandant of the District of the Cumberland, which comprises all the Department of the Cumberland north of the Duck River.

TULLAHOMA, July 18, 1863.—By a courier just from Huntsville, I learn that General Stanley captured some three hundred prisoners and twelve hundred horses and mules, with as many contrabands riding them.

He does not intend to be idle, and you may soon expect to hear from him again.

The editor of the Memphis Bulletin, who has been on a visit to Nashville, communicates to his paper and vouches for the truth of the statement, an account of a number of cruelties committed by a regiment of North Carolina troops under command of Col. Keitte upon citizens of East Tennessee. It is hoped, however, that it is exaggerated, as in this age, it is difficult to believe that any body of men, even in times of war, could perpetrate such horrible cruelties.

The Abolitionists keep, this year, Abolition Day," as it is called, (1st August) at Abington, Mass.—it being the anniversary of West India Emancipation. Edmund Quincy, President of the Massachusetts Anti-Slavery Society, announces that among the expected speakers on the occasion are Wm. Lloyd Garrison, Wendell Phillips, William Wells Brown (black man) Henry C. Wright.

The police and soldiers of New York city have been visiting various tenements in the upper Wards for the purpose of collecting concealed weapons. They found quantities of rifles, pistols, bowies, slung-shots, &c.

POSTSCRIPT.

From the Army of the Potomac.

HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTOMAC,
July 25, 1863.—The Confederates were in force near Front Royal yesterday. Their cavalry were drove from Manassas Gap about sunset.

It is believed they now intend to cross the Blue Ridge, at Chester or Thornton's Gap.—At the former place they will meet with obstacles.
