

FALSE REPORTS.—The reiteration of the stories of prolonged debate in the Cabinet on the question of the terms on which the seceded States shall be restored to the Union, is entirely mythical. It is not believed here that the subject has yet been before Mr. Lincoln's Cabinet pro forma. All these sensations, therefore, are merely based on the views supposed to be entertained by the individual members of the Cabinet, and not on the simple authoritative expression of an opinion. [N. An English physician from Richmond represents the city as being garrisoned by no troops, although the streets are filled with officers. He saw no gun-boats in the harbor, but is aware of the fact that the Confederates are building a couple of iron-clads.

The Bankers of Brooklyn, New York, have all refused to advance the money (one million of dollars) voted by the Common Council of that city, to pay the commutation money for conscripts. The mayor, under authority of the Common Council, has advertised for a public loan of the amount or any portion thereof, at seven per cent. on certificate, with a promise that application shall be made to the next Legislature for authority to issue bonds to raise the money to pay the certificates.

We learn from the Panama Star and Herald that affairs in Salvador are still in a grievous condition, and the latest news from Acapulco is that the Church party had declared for Maximilian, and that a French fleet was to sail from France for the purpose of taking possession of Sonora. This last is improbable.

Col. Green, Chief Quartermaster of the Department of Washington, has prepared a plan for the erection of a contraband village on Arlington Heights, and the work is to be commenced at once.

At the close of the last fiscal year—that is to say, on the 31st of March, 1863—the British national debt consisted of £783,336,739 funded debt and £16,425,400 unfunded—making, in all, £799,822,139.

General Burnside's old Ninth Army Corps has begun to arrive in Cincinnati. The entire corps will be in Kentucky shortly. Gen. Burnside and staff left Cincinnati on Monday, bound South. It is thought an important movement is about to be made in his department.

The statement that at the time of the shooting of the Detective Fawpelle, the gunboat "Cœur de Lion," was acting in concert with the detective force, and that the detective was shot by one of the crew of that vessel, is incorrect, as the Cœur de Lion was stationed up at Indian Head at the time of the occurrence. It was the Teaser.

The owners of the American ship Nora, which was destroyed not long ago by the Alabama, have protested to the Secretary of State, alleging that they shall hold the British government responsible for their loss, amounting to \$80,000.

FROM MARTINSBURG, VA.

Correspondence of the Phil. Inq.

MARTINSBURG, Va., August 11, 1863.—Martinsburg bears the same appearance that it did before the invasion of General Lee, and but few faces amongst the residents are absent from one's memory. Little was done by the Confederates except to the railroad, which received their attention; some eight miles of the rails having been destroyed.

Several of the hotels are opened again for business.

Gen. McReynolds is in command here.

The First New York Cavalry and the Twelfth Pennsylvania Cavalry are encamped but a short distance from the town.

Bushwhacking has become flat and unprofitable, and but little of it is done.

The town of Winchester is in a forlorn condition; neither side occupy it and its inhabitants must necessarily enjoy profound quiet. A company of cavalry have had issued to it two days' rations, and will pass through there on a scout.

A scouting party, composed principally of the First New York Cavalry, returned last night from a four days' scout. They entered Loudon county through Snicker's Gap, and reached Leesburg, destroyed a considerable amount of Confederate army stores, but saw no enemy.

The latest estimates of the claims against N. York city on account of losses incurred in the late riots are two million dollars. At first it was said that the amount would not exceed four hundred and fifty thousand dollars. At this rate a few days more will carry the amount up to three million dollars.

"Little Crow" the Indian chief, who has been so prominent in late disturbances out in the North West, it is supposed has been killed in a recent skirmish.

The Potomac flotilla reports nothing new on the lower Potomac, and no movements of Confederate troops in the Northern Neck.

An important order has just been issued from the War Department in regard to the reduction of the amount of transportation for troops in the field, which indicates an active fall campaign.

INTERNAL REVENUE.

NOTICE.—All persons are hereby notified and required to make out a list or lists of all income, property, goods, wares, and merchandise articles or objects owned by them or of which they have care, or management, subject to duty or tax, together with the amount (if any) due for license, under and in conformity with "an act to provide Internal Revenue to support the Government and pay interest on the public debt," approved, July 1st 1862, and an act amendatory thereof, approved March 3d, 1863, and present the same to me at 160 Prince St., within 15 days from the date hereof.

Sec. 9 imposes a penalty of five hundred dollars, for delivering a false or fraudulent list.

Sec. 11 imposes a penalty of 50 per cent. on the amount of the tax and a forfeiture of \$100 for neglect or refusal to furnish the required list.

BALTIMORE LETTER.

[Correspondence of the Philada. Inquirer.]

BALTIMORE, August 13.—We have had a most welcome change in the weather. Quite a heavy storm passed over our city about five o'clock this morning, accompanied with vivid lightning and heavy peals of thunder. It is still raining steadily, and the atmosphere is fresh and delightful. The thermometer registers at present about 70 degrees. There were some deaths and a number of sunstrokes yesterday from the heat.

There was not a full representation of delegates yesterday at the meeting of the Union State Central Committee, which met in convention, in consequence of due notice not being given, and the meeting adjourned until the 26th inst., without transacting any business, when it will again assemble in this city.

Some thirty to forty—probably more—of the prisoners captured at Gettysburg and elsewhere recently, have within the past few days enlisted here in the Federal service.

The Old Point boat brings no news this morning, beyond what we have already had, from Charleston.

Gentlemen just from the Army of the Potomac, say all is quiet there. Active operations are not anticipated for some time to come.
