

FROM CHARLESTON.

A telegraphic dispatch from Fortress Monroe, to Washington, dated to-day, states that the gunboat Western World, Capt. Gregory, there from off Wilmington, reports the arrival there of the United States steamer Florida, from Charleston, with intelligence that the Federal forces occupied Forts Sumter and Wagner on Monday last.

The correspondent of the Baltimore American writing from before Charleston on the 21st says:—"I am sorry to learn that the 300-pounder Parrott burst yesterday after the seventh fire. It was fired but seven times, the first shot fell short, but the other six went square through the wall. Both of the Whitworth guns of the Naval Battery are also disabled. The finest one showed symptoms of bursting, and the second, yesterday by premature explosion killed four of the gunners."

Lewis B. Nelson, a prominent lawyer of Culpeper died recently.

The Secretary of War having become acquainted with the fact that between four and five hundred Confederate prisoners of war at Fort Delaware had taken the oath and been mustered in to a regiment, to be called the 3d Maryland cavalry, directed that the proceeding should be annulled, and that they should be returned to their quarters in prison. It was apprehended that so large a number of former enemies of the United States Government in one regiment would prove a dangerous experiment; and it has been ordered that they shall be scattered among different regiments.

The Springfield Republican says.—"It does not lessen the horror of the act, but rather adds to it, to know that Quantrell's men were taking vengeance for crimes committed by Kansas jayhawkers in Western Missouri. The people of Lawrence have suffered for the excesses committed by Jenison and his gang, and encouraged by such men as Lane, and the innocent have been ruined for the sins of the guilty."

The widow of Admical Foote, died a New Haven on Wednesday evening last, just two months subsequent to the death of her lamented husband. She died of quick consumption.
