Contemplated Re-Capture of Norfolk.

(Correspondence of the Philadelphia Inquirer.)

NORFOLK, VA., Sept. 8.—From information of the most positive character, coming through Confederate sources, there can be no doubt that the Confederates are contemplating the re-capture of this city at an early date, and are now consummating their plans to that effect.

The expedition against the city is to be committed to General Longstreet and several Generals of lesser light, who are well acquainted with the topography of the country. The forces are to be divided and advanced from three different points. A large body of troops will be massed at Suffolk, to make a feint and draw the Federal troops there, while the attack is being made upon the City by another body advancing through Princess Ann county with a strong reserve. A third party is to appear in the vicinity of Sewells Point, while all this is going on, to attract the troops stationed north of the city.

Within a short time past a number of Confederate deserters have come in to the lines and given information that some such movement is on foot. The Confederate scouts, too, have latterly been prowling in rather close proximity to the Union lines. A large Confederate force is now along the Blackwater. This also confirms the belief that the move is soon to be made by the Confederates.

Norfolk is strongly defended by earthworks of no mean quality. (Very doubtful story.)

NEW YORK POLITICS.

The "Constitutional Union" Convention which met at Albany, N. Y. yesterday nominated E. P. Norton for Attorney General and R. F. Stevens for State Prison Inspector. The nomination of the remainder of the ticket has been referred to the State committee. The Convention adopted the same resolutions as those adopted at Rochester, with one additional, deprecating any departure from constitutional grounds.

In the Democratic Convention at Albany yesterday, Amasa J. Parker was made permanent president. The Tammany and Mozart delegations from New York were both admitted, each delegation to cast eight votes and alternate the ninth—Tammany to cast the first ninth vote. This result was greeted with great applause. The McKean delegates left the hall. A motion to invite these delegates to seats on the floor was lost. In the evening Governor Seymour addressed the Convention at length on the topics of the day.
