

LATEST NEWS.

UNITED STATES DISTRICT COURT.—Pursuant to adjournment on Monday, this Court opened this morning at the Court Room in the Custom House building.

On motion of L. H. Chandler, Joseph H. Bradley, of Washington, and S. F. Beach and G. S. Miner of this place were admitted to practice as advocates and proctors in the U. S. District Court for the Eastern District of Virginia.

Cause No. 4—United States vs. C. M. Casdolen, was taken up and defended by J. H. Bradley, who files an answer.

A motion was filed by Messrs. Beach and Bradley to consolidate the several causes wherein the parties are the same.

The Court adjourned till to-morrow morning at 11 o'clock.

A letter from Alexandria, Va., in the Philadelphia Inquirer, says:—"The city and its surroundings present an extremely warlike appearance. On all sides are the tented fields of the infantry, while upon every hill-top are seen the frowning battlements of forts, with their 'Parrots,' and other speaking instruments of defence, ready for the fray. In the city are the immense palisades erected around the railroad depot, and near the river front, for protection against cavalry raids: and in the river the trim and fearless gunboats quietly await the presence of any threatening foe. In the Quartermaster's Department bales of hay without number, tower towards the sky in huge piles awaiting transportation; long rows of buildings are filled with grain, casks of meat, boxes of hard bread, and all the 'et cetera' that make up the rations of the Union soldiery. There too are located large Government carpenter and other workshops, with hundreds of busy mechanics making various articles for army use. A two storied brick building contains two steam fire engines, with their horses and all the improved means for readily extinguishing fires that may occur in Government property or in the city."

SITUATION OF GEN. ROSECRANS.

The Washington correspondent of the New York Commercial Advertiser refers as follows to the latest official news from Gen. Rosecrans's headquarters:

"Telegraphic communications direct from Gen. Rosecrans' headquarters has been established with Washington, so as the President and Gen. Halleck can know almost hourly the condition of the situation in and about Chattanooga. It seems that the reinforcements ordered from so many quarters did not reach Gen. Rosecrans as soon as many anticipated, but he telegraphs at last that large numbers of troops have now joined him. In view of the natural impediments between Chattanooga and Kentucky, it may be doubted if a more rapid movement of troops has ever been made. Of course some journals are talking about Gen. R. resuming the offensive immediately, just as though troops placed in new brigades, divisions, and corps were to be rushed on to a field whose natural advantages are yet believed to be with the enemy. The reorganization of this army will require a little more time, that its efficiency may insure success on the resumption of the campaign."

John J. Astor jr. and several other prominent citizens of New York have appointed a committee to arrange for a grand entertainment to be given to the Russians. It is not yet settled whether the French and English naval officers are to be admitted.

The Forrest divorce case was again up before the New York Court yesterday, and an order granted by the Court to enforce the payment of the bonds that were given as security for the alimony awarded to Mrs. Forrest.

The Washington Republican states, on what authority we know not, that the U. S. has positive information that the Confederates contemplated throwing "Greek Fire" into the cities of Philadelphia and New York, providing the iron-clad Atlanta had escaped from the port of Savannah. This is doubtful.

The correspondent of the Philadelphia Inquirer says:—"A few days ago a brother of Mr. Seddon, the Confederate Secretary of War, crossed the Rappahannock near Falmouth, on pretense of visiting a farm he said belonged to him, in the vicinity. He gave an assumed name. A colored servant, who accompanied him, on being questioned, told his master's real name and position, when an attempt was made by the Federal troops to arrest Seddon, but he made his escape across the river."

The Philadelphia Inquirer says:—"A band of guerillas, under the famous White, of Loudoun county, Va., made a raid last night into Langley, six miles above Georgetown, driving in the pickets. They had two pieces of artillery."

The case of Hunter, Chief Clerk of the State Department, against Count Garowski, will be tried in the Washington Criminal Court this week. The indictment charges that Garowski published certain language for the purpose of inducing a belief that Hunter had violated the confidence reposed in him as an officer of the Government.

The election in Ohio takes place one week from to-day. Arrangements are being made to have the soldiers from that State absent from the State vote at precincts to be established, and the judges, &c., to be appointed by proper authorities.
