

LATER FROM EUROPE.

The steamship Etna has passed Cape Race with European dates to the 15th inst. The Paris correspondent of the Morning Post asserts that France has no intention of recognizing the Confederacy. A guard of marines has been placed on board the rams seized in the Mersey. The London Times says that nothing is yet certain in regard to the rams. They are, however, suspected of a destination, like the Alabama, but will not be allowed to slip off as she did.

Cotton sales of two days, 50,000 bales, including 25,000 to speculators and exporters. The market is excited, with an advance of 1@1 1/2d. The Manchester market is busy and excited, with an advance in cotton goods of 2d. Breadstuffs, on the 14th inst., were more steady, and firmer.

The London Times says the question of the legality of the furnishing of the rams will be fully argued on its legal merits, and the vessels will either be permitted to leave "with clear bills or not at all."

Napoleon had addressed an autograph letter to Maximilian, approving of his reply to the Mexican deputation. The Emperor elect was to set out for Mexico in February or March of next year.

Queen Victoria, with two of her daughters, were thrown from a carriage near Balmoral. They escaped with some slight bruises.

It is recommended to the directors of the company to dispatch the Great Eastern on a lengthy trading voyage, where she would have but little competition.

PRESIDENT LINCOLN'S LETTER.

President Lincoln's reply to the Missouri delegation, and his letter of instructions to Gen. Schofield, appear in the St. Louis Democrat. The main points of the reply are: He fails to see that the condition of Missouri, and the wrongs and sufferings of the Union men, are attributable to weakness, wickedness, and immorality, but rather to civil war, of which he gives a vivid picture, referring to the condition of the State under Fremont, Hunter, Halleck, and Curtis, to sustain his position. He does not believe the massacre at Lawrence proves imbecility on the part of General Schofield, as similar acts could have been committed by John Morgan had he so chosen. He approves Schofield's action in preventing a counter raid into Missouri, by citizens of Kansas, as the only safe way to avoid indiscriminate massacre, and says the charges that Gen. Schofield has purposely withheld protection from loyal people, and purposed to facilitate the objects of the disloyal, are altogether beyond belief.

The Christian Commission, having received assurances from the Confederate authorities at Richmond that packages sent to prisoners in that vicinity would be faithfully distributed to Union prisoners, have just dispatched twenty-one boxes of clothing, hospital stores, medicines, and reading matter for the Union soldiers confined in Richmond prisons.

Thursday afternoon a collision occurred on the North river, opposite New York, between the two large steamers, the City of Boston, of the New York and Norwich line, and the Oregon, of the New York and Hudson line. The collision resulted in the sinking in a few minutes of the Oregon, which was nearly cut in two. No one was lost, and but one slightly injured.

The counties of Hancock, Brooke and Ohio, in Western Virginia, have been detached from the department of the Monongahela, and added to the Department of West Virginia, under Gen. Kelly.

The election for three members of Congress and members of the Legislature in West Virginia took place on Thursday. The candidates for Congress are all Union men.
