

EXPEDITION INTO ALABAMA.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 4.—Accounts from Corinth, Miss., to the 27th October, state that Col. Spencer's expedition into Alabama, which left that place on the 19th, penetrated to within fifteen miles of Jasper, over one hundred and fifty from Corinth, and returned yesterday. The whole cavalry force of Tusculum Valley was concentrating to cut him off. While endeavoring to press his command, which was about five hundred strong, between them, Col. Spencer encountered a force of from one thousand to thirteen hundred, under Gen. Ferguson, in the southeast corner of Tishomi county, and was quite roughly handled. Colonel Spencer formed a square of three lines of battle. As one position after another was outflanked, and the regiment becoming disordered and surrounded, he led it into the woods, where the Confederates were held in check until night, when it broke up into squads, the men being all intimately acquainted with the country, and coming out the best way they could. They have not all arrived here yet, but it is believed not over fifty will be captured.

Captains Chandler, Pulo and Stemburg, of Jolliet, Illinois, were killed; also Lieut. Perry, of company L, 1st Alabama Cavalry. Lieut. Swift, of Ottawa, was mortally wounded, and ten privates were killed. As far as heard from some twenty were wounded, who, being unable to keep the saddle, were left on the field.—Those whose wounds were slight were brought off, and a number carried some distance and left with friends. The Confederate loss was more severe, as they rushed in large numbers upon the Federals who were under cover.

LATEST NEWS.

From the Philadelphia Inquirer.

Gen. Sherman has formally assumed command of the Department of Tennessee, and has issued a series of important orders for its government and the better instruction of his subalterns.

One of the detectives in the U. S. Government service, at Alexandria, states that a large number of persons belonging to the Confederate army are now in the counties of Stafford and Prince William.

It was the Confederate General Gary who was recently captured at Colliersville.

New York is alive with excitement about the ball to be given in honor of Admiral Lissovski and the Russian Navy to-night. The preparations are upon the grandest and most extravagant scale ever known in that most extravagant of cities.

A Cairo telegram announces the arrival there, night before last, of the steamer Live Oak, from New Orleans. She brought two hundred and twenty hogsheads of sugar and thirty-nine barrels of molasses from that city, which was distributed at various places along the river.

The ship Europa arrived at New York yesterday, and reported that she was chased by a full-rigged brig on the 27th of October, but night coming on succeeded in escaping from her.

One hundred and four Confederate prisoners have this week been removed from the rendezvous at David's Island to Bedloe's Island. Only eleven Confederates remain on David's Island. These will be taken away as soon as they are sufficiently recovered from their sickness, and David's Island will be devoted to hospital purposes.

Mr. Dodge, on behalf of the Ohio Relief Committee, visited the paaoled prisoners at Annapolis on Wednesday, and reports that of the one hundred and eighty invalids who arrived there last Thursday from Richmond, forty have already died and many others are in a dying condition.

Considerable attention was attracted by a light steam carriage on Broadway, New York, on Wednesday. It has the appearance of an ordinary buggy, minus the shafts, and the steam apparatus was on the rear axle.—Two persons were riding in the carriage, which moved quietly and smoothly.

The U. S. Navy Department is about building a fleet of wooden vessels of war of three thousand tons burden, to be completed within a year. The machinery is already in process of construction. Twelve of these vessels are to be clippers, built with special reference to speed, and carrying light batteries.
