

DEFERRED ITEMS.

A correspondent of the New York Times, writing from Alexandria, under date of the 25th ult., in speaking of the hospitals here, says:—"The various hospitals are consolidated into divisions, under the charge of one Chief Surgeon, each building having its Acting Surgeon. The reported statistics show about 9,000 sick and wounded soldiers admitted and cared for, of whom over 6,000 have been discharged cured, and returned to their commands for duty."

There are now in the U. S. at least two hundred and thirty-five general hospitals for the use of the soldiers, containing about eighty thousand patients. To show on what a large scale the battles have been fought, it seems that during four months of 1862 there were treated at those hospitals twenty thousand nine hundred and thirty cases of gunshot wounds.

Joseph Detweller, of York county, Pennsylvania, was arrested last week on the charge of attempting to evade the income tax. It is alleged that he divided his property among his children, so that it should not come within the provisions of the law. He has been held to answer.

Dr. Chapman, of London, has been for years engaged in studies and experiments connected with the nervous system alone, with such men as Dr. Brown, Sequard and Claude Bernard of Paris. For the past year he has been proving a great discovery—namely, the cure of epilepsy, and many diseases hitherto deemed incurable, by means of the external application of ice and hot water, in India rubber bags, at various parts of the spinal cord, acting thus upon the sympathetic nerve, and through it upon the most important and vital regions of the body.

Letters patent of the U. S. have recently been issued to Napoleon Felix Boreiko de Chodzko, of Paris, for an improvement in furnaces of every kind, by which all smoke is entirely consumed, increase of draught obtained, and a saving of thirty-three per cent of fuel secured, and these results are required without the use of chimneys of more than ordinary height.

The great Boston organ, which has been seven years in building, was formally exhibited at Music Hall, in that city, on Saturday evening. The Boston papers describe the scene as one of "unexampled enthusiasm."

Captain John Frazier, Jr., Provost Marshal of Draft for the First Congressional District of Md., has been ordered by Major N. L. Jeffries, Assistant Provost Marshal for Md. and Delaware, to report under arrest to him.—Among other matters in which Captain Frazier is charged with acting improperly, is his having made arrests of all the regularly nominated Union candidates in Kent county, and sending them out of the county under arrest.—He was himself a candidate on the opposition ticket for the Clerkship of the Circuit Court of the county. Col. Tavis has been arrested by Gen. Schenck, on the charge of acting in excess of authority in Kent county, and issuing a proclamation to the people on election day.

An account of the balloon voyage made by M. Nadar, from Paris to Germany, in his great balloon, the Giant, is given in the foreign papers. The lives of the party were in imminent danger at the moment of the descent. It was said, indeed, that they were saved only by the foresight and heroism of M. Jules Goddard.—Some of the voyagers were very seriously injured.
