

PLOT TO DESTROY BUFFALO.

BUFFALO, November 12.—The following was received here to-day:

WASHINGTON—Midnight, November 11.—To the Mayor of Buffalo: The British Minister, Lord Lyons, has to-night officially notified the Government that, from telegraphic information received from the Governor General of Canada, there is reason to believe there is a plot on foot by persons who have found asylum in Canada to invade the United States and destroy the city of Buffalo. That they propose to take possession of some steamboats on Lake Erie to surprise Johnson's Island, free the prisoners of war confined there, and proceed with them to Buffalo. This Government will employ all means in its power to suppress any hostile attack from Canada; but as other towns and cities on the shores of the lakes are exposed to the same danger, it is deemed proper to communicate this information to you, in order that any precautions which the circumstances of the case will permit may be taken. The Governor General suggests that steamboats or other vessels giving cause for suspicion, by the number or character of persons on board, shall be arrested.

You will please acknowledge the receipt of this telegram, and communicate to this Department any information you may now or hereafter have on this subject.

The New York World says: "We are informed by dealers in coal that the high price of that article is not due to the extravagant rates the workmen charge, but to a combination among the leading coal companies. It is true the miners receive very high wages, more in fact than the rates paid operatives in other employments would justify; but this is an entirely inadequate reason to account for the increase from \$6.50 to \$11.00 and \$12.00 per ton. In point of fact, this enormous advance has no justification. The addition of two or even three dollars on a ton might be borne, in view of the depreciation of the currency or an accidentally excessive demand, but \$11 or \$12 is a downright swindle."

In Washington, memorials are being circulated through all the departments for the signatures of the clerks, asking Congress to increase the salaries twenty-five per centum.—Almost everything in Washington is a hundred per centum higher than it was last year at this time, the demand being so great. It is estimated that exclusive of the soldiers quartered in the city, there are seventy-five thousand more people in Washington than the usually accredited permanent census of the city eighteen months ago.

Brig. Gen. Joseph P. Taylor, Commissary General U. S. Army, has been relieved from duty in Washington and ordered to Chattanooga. Col. Shilas, next in rank in the Commissary Department, succeeds Gen. Taylor.

Gen. Foster and Staff, lately relieved from duty at Fortress Monroe, arrived in Washington yesterday morning.

In spite of the frost, the Kentucky tobacco crop it is said will foot up something like 100,000 hogsheads.

The newly elected Governor of Georgia, Hon. Joseph E. Brown, was inaugurated on the 7th instant.

The Richmond Examiner is reported as admitting a Confederate defeat on the Rappahannock, and also that Hook's and Hayes' brigades were captured.


