

THE REPORTED CONSPIRACY.

BUFFALO, Nov. 13.—Mayor Fargo has received a second dispatch from Secretary Stanton, stating that Major General Dix has been ordered to Buffalo to adopt measures for the security of the frontier against the plottings of the traitors who have taken refuge in the British Provinces. The Mayor has taken measures to guard against incendiaries. He is also in communication with Gov. Seymour in relation to military affairs.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 13.—No additional intelligence relative to the Johnson's Island affair, beyond that already telegraphed, has been received. All was quiet in that vicinity last night. The Gazette's special dispatch from Columbus says that a large force of infantry and two batteries of artillery were sent there yesterday. Gen. Cox left Columbus for Sandusky on a special train last night.

BUFFALO, Nov. 13.—The Cleveland Leader of yesterday says that a telegram was received between 12 and 1 o'clock, from the officers at Johnson's Island, asking that a regiment be sent to Johnson's Island immediately. In response 850 men of the 12th Ohio cavalry were sent.

This morning it is reported here that the captain of a propeller from Sandusky reports that a tunnel has been discovered leading from the prisoners' quarters on Johnson's Island to some woods several hundred feet distant; also, that six hundred muskets have been found in this tunnel, which undoubtedly were brought from Canada.

The plot was to seize the steamer Michigan and two of the New York Central propellers, and make a raid on the shipping and city of Buffalo.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 13.—Lieutenant Harris, commanding the Pittsburg battery of six 12 pounders (Napoleons) and one hundred and twenty-five men, passed through here for Erie this morning for defence against pirates on the lake.

SANDUSKY, Nov. 13.—Everything is quiet here and in the vicinity. There is very little excitement in the city in regard to the reported plot. Gen. Cox and staff passed to the island this morning. Everything is being put in readiness for them, should they attempt to carry out their scheme, and with troops here and on the way, Johnson's Island and Sandusky may be considered safe beyond a doubt. Batteries have been posted and fully command the entrance to the harbor, and would sink any vessel attempting to enter our bay. The steamer Michigan is off Johnson's Island ready for action. All the reports about an attempt at escape by the prisoners, thus far are simply false. No indications of any such intentions have been manifested up to the present time.

The candidates for the various offices in the gift of the U. S. House of Representatives are multiplying. The most prominent are the following: For Speaker—Schuyler Colfax, of Indiana, and E. B. Washburne, of Illinois. For Clerk—S. C. Carey, of Kentucky, and S. C. Fessenden, of Maine. For Doorkeeper—Capt. Goodnow, of New Hampshire, and Hawkins Taylor, of Iowa. For Postmaster—Noah Brooks of The Sacramento Union, W. H. King, of Minnesota, J. Beebe of the same State, and others not very prominent at present. General Blair will not be a candidate for Speaker, but Hon. Mr. Dawes, of Massachusetts, has been named as a candidate. Emerson Etheridge, of Tennessee, and Thomas B. Florence are talked of for the clerkship. There are other candidates than those named, but the nominations in the Republican caucus will doubtless be selected from the above.

Travel on the Fourth Sixth and Eighth avenue railroads, at New York, was almost suspended on Thursday, in consequence of a strike for an increase of wages by the drivers and conductors. The Second and Third avenue roads have advanced the rates without solicitation.
