

COUNTY COURT.—In the Court to-day, Sampson White, a free negro, appeared and qualified for the purpose of celebrating the rites of matrimony between negroes.

Administration on the estate of Daniel Vogelgesang was granted to Jacob Vogelgesang.

Robt. Hodgkins was exonerated from an erroneous assessment of a tax of \$7.20.

Margaret McIlraw vs. A. Moore—unlawful detainer—jury unable to agree, and case continued.

Goetter vs. Parsons et al.—on an appeal—continued.

All the justices were ordered to be summoned to attend the next term of the court for classification.

S. N. Garwood qualified as administrator on the estate of Wm. Howard, deceased.

Steed vs. Roach—unlawful detainer—verdict for the plaintiff.

LEGISLATURE.—No quorum appearing to-day in the lower house of the Legislature which met in this place yesterday, an adjournment until to-morrow at 12 o'clock, took place. The Senate awaiting the organization of the House of Delegates adjourned over until to-morrow.

The report which has been going the rounds of the Northern press for some days that Gen. Breckinridge died on the 27th ult., of wounds received at Ringgold, turns out, as we stated, to be unfounded. The Richmond Enquirer of Friday last contains a dispatch from Dalton, Georgia, on the 2d instant, stating that on the previous day Gen. Breckinridge was serenaded and made an appropriate speech, the occasion being the retirement of Gen. Bragg from the command of the army.

For the information of those interested, it is stated that provisions and clothing for Confederate prisoners, by recent regulations, are not permitted to be sent to Point Lookout via Baltimore.

The Admiral of the Russian fleet lying in the river above here, visited this place to-day and dined with the Military Governor.

There was no session of the U. S. District Court to-day.

FROM THE ARMY OF THE POTOMAC.
[Special dispatch to the N. Y. Tribune.]

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—On Saturday afternoon the Confederates made a feint of crossing at the several fords on the Rapidan. The Federal forces were kept on the alert, and everything in readiness to retreat if an assault had been made by a superior force.

During the night the Confederates crossed over two or three regiments at each ford, and took possession of the north bank of the Rapidan and the Federal signal station, so that they can now overlook all the Federal movements while they remain posted as at present.

A young man employed by Quartermaster Fitch at Vienna was captured by guerrillas one mile from camp yesterday afternoon. Eight of Moseby's men were captured by cavalry scouts yesterday within three miles of Vienna. They were sent to Washington.

At half past 6 o'clock last night a party of guerrillas attacked a train on the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, two miles east of Bealton Station. The engine was struck by bullets in fifteen or twenty places, and engineer Taylor had his cap pierced by a rifle ball.

Gen. Meagher, who was with the army as a visitor to his old brigade, was captured in citizen's clothes, near Mine Run, during the recent engagement, and is now in the hands of the Confederates.

An Official Dispatch from General Foster.

TAZEWELL, Tenn., Dec. 7—7 A. M.—Major Gen. H. W. Halleck, Commander-in-Chief:—Longstreet is in full retreat up the Valley, your orders about following with cavalry shall be carried out.

My division of cavalry attacked the enemy's cavalry in one of the passes of the Clinch Mountains yesterday afternoon, and are pushing them vigorously.

I have not yet heard of the approach of our cavalry from Knoxville.

I have sent Gen. Wilcox with his infantry and artillery toward the mountains and attack the enemy's flank at Bean Station.

Couriers from Knoxville arrived last night. The road is clear. Sherman arrived there yesterday.

A letter from Arkansas to the N. Y. Herald, dated the 25th ult., says: "General Washburn and command are moving on Matagorda, with every prospect of capturing that place."
