

FOREIGN NEWS.

The steamer Canada, with Liverpool advices to the 28th ult., has arrived at Halifax. The steamer Rappahannock, said to have been one of the four vessels recently purchased by the Confederates in England sailed from Sheerness, England, on the 26th, for Calais, France, in an unfinished state. She had on board a gang of carpenters, and is pierced for eight guns. She was seized by the French custom-house authorities, but subsequently released.

The citizens of the U. S. in London observed the 26th of November as a day of Thanksgiving, pursuant to the proclamation of President Lincoln. Business was suspended at the U. S. Legation and at the Consulate's, and a grand banquet was given at St. James Hall, under the presidency of the Hon. Robert J. Walker. The banquet was attended by Mr. Adams, the Secretary of the Legation, and many prominent citizens of the U. S.

Advices from Paris hint that England's refusal to attend the Congress may lead France to form a new and more intimate alliance elsewhere.

The French deficit, owing to the Mexican and Cochinchina wars, is represented at ten million pounds.

It is rumored that M. Fould is about to propose a loan of three hundred millions of francs.

The agitation in Germany continues in reference to Holstein. The Saxony Chamber of Deputies have unanimously recognized the rights of Prince Augustenburg, and promised the support of that Government.

Two divisions of the Prussian army are now under orders ready to take the field. They number 35,000.

A resolution is pending in the Prussian Chambers to place all the means at the disposal of the Government for the energetic guardianship of German rights.

The Wurtemberg Government urges an immediate occupation of Holstein by the Federal troops.

The Turin, Italy, journals say that the soldiers on furlough are being recalled, and that the garrisons are being increased in the Venetian provinces, and the work on the fortifications is being accelerated.

Polish affairs remain unchanged. Two hundred public functionaries have been arrested at Warsaw and condemned to Siberia.

Telegrams from India announce the alarming illness of Lord Elgin. On the 14th of November he was fast sinking. The Times announces that his Lordship is dead, but the information is not considered wholly reliable.

Senator Wilson, of Massachusetts, Chairman of the U. S. Senate Committee on Military Affairs, and the author of the Conscription law, it is said is not in favor of the repeal of the three hundred dollars commutation clause, but believes in other alterations, which he will probably bring before the Senate at an early day. Among these will be a proposition to do away with the classification of drafted men, making only one class between twenty and forty-five years of age. This proposition is also understood to be favored by some of the leading members of the House.

A man named Thos. R. Steele, alias Thos. Christy, who had been doing an extensive business in dealing in counterfeit money has been arrested in Washington. On his person was found, besides a large sum of counterfeit money, about \$450 in U. S. Treasury notes, the proceeds of the sales of this bogus currency.

There is no news from Gen. Longstreet, who, according to latest Confederate accounts was retreating on Morrisville—a strong position—to give battle.
