

THE SOUTHERN NEWS.

A bill has passed the Confederate House of Representatives to prevent the enrollment or enlistment of substitutes in the Confederate army.

The Richmond Dispatch of the 16th has the following, dated Dalton, Ga., Dec. 10, '63:

"But little importance is attached to the report circulating in Atlanta, in regard to the appointment of Gen. Johnston to the command of this army, with Gen. Bragg as chief of staff. While such an arrangement of the command would give satisfaction to the army, the belief in well-informed circles is that it will not be made. It is more likely that Gen. Beauregard will be sent to us."

The Richmond Examiner has violent articles against the Confederate Executive, especially the recommendation in the Message concerning conscription, &c.

C. W. C. Dunnington is announced as a candidate to represent Stafford, King George and Prince William counties in the Virginia Senate.

Richmond papers to the 16th, contain no special news. The Federal movements in the Shenandoah valley are reported. There had been a fight in Greenbrier county, in which the Confederates were compelled to fall back through Lewisburg, which was occupied by the Federal forces. The success of the Federal expedition to Charles City Court-House is acknowledged. The Confederate loss at Look-out and Missionary Ridge is put down at three hundred and twenty-three killed, one thousand nine hundred and sixty-six wounded, and two thousand missing.

The Richmond Enquirer of the 12th contains the following items:

We are gratified to learn that Gen. John H. Morgan has been heard from safe in Dixie, having crossed the Ohio river near Ashland, and made his way into the Confederate lines. It is not known when Gen. Morgan will visit Richmond, but whenever he does it is proposed to give him a reception suitable to the high estimation in which he is held by his fellow-citizens of Richmond.

We give notice to Gen. Winder and his people to be on the look out for one "Joshua C. Gunnell an influential citizen," who has received permission from the enemy's War Department to come to Richmond "for the purpose of obtaining the release of several Union men in Castle Thunder." The Vice President of the Confederate States was refused permission to visit Washington upon a similar errand of mercy although his character was known and precluded all idea that he could mean to act as a spy.

Major John Seddon, of Stafford, a member of the State Senate, is dead.

An arrival at New York from Charleston bar, with advices to the 13th, reports the recent heavy gale as having swept away nearly all of the Confederate obstructions to the harbor, and the entrance is now believed to be clear, a fact which, it is supposed, the Federal fleet would take advantage of. Confederate dispatches of a later date, however, have been published, making no mention of the storm or its effects on their works.

Twenty-four of the Arctic fleet of whalers have arrived at Honolulu, averaging each 1,600 barrels of oil, and 400,000 pounds of bone. Whales were very abundant during the latter part of the season. Hundreds of vessels could easily have been filled with them without perceptibly diminishing their number.

A Norfolk letter of the 16th instant says:—"General Butler has commenced the work of administering the oath recommended by the proclamation of the President. Yesterday over two thousand took the oath. The administration of it will be continued to-day."
