

SOUTHERN NEWS.

The Richmond Enquirer of Tuesday, Dec. 22d, has the following:—

A dispatch from East Tennessee, dated, Bristol, Dec. 21, says:

“Officers from the front state that our forces are moving forward in the direction of Knoxville. The country between Bean’s Station and Morristown has been cleared of the enemy. Only 300 prisoners were captured in the engagement at Bean’s Station, as the men stopped to pillage the wagon train, which was loaded with coffee, sugar, canvassed hams and shoes. But for this, many more might have been captured.

Reports from below state that Imboden and Echols have surrounded the Salem raiders, and the entire party will probably be captured. The enemy have burned their wagons and destroyed their artillery to prevent their falling into our hands. The railroad between this point and Lynchburg will be in running order by Saturday.

The Enquirer claims that the food prospects in Virginia are as favorable as could be desired, and, from a comparison with the consumption of the past two years, assumes that on the 1st of February, 1864, there will be in the counties of the State of Virginia within the Confederate lines 100,000 horses, 400,000 cattle, 500,000 hogs, and 550,000 sheep. The cattle and hogs, the Enquirer thinks, would give 180,000,000 pounds of meat, not counting the sheep. But these resources are in the hands of the people, and not of the Government, and the former are therefore urged to contribute liberally.

Provisions in the Richmond market are quoted at high rates in Confederate money.

The Confederate Congress is in session.—The business principally relates to army matters, such as substitutes, impressments, &c.

The Richmond Examiner says:—“We understand that Gen. Longstreet, in his reports of his campaign against Burnside, says he lost seven hundred men in the attack on Knoxville, and that the place would have been carried by assault but for the misunderstanding of orders by some of his subaltern officers. It seems that our men, after suffering heavily, had reached the enemy’s entrenchments, and here for a long time kept awaiting orders that never came; and the enemy having rallied and gathered reinforcements, forced them to retire.”

New arrangements concerning passengers from the army of the Potomac have been completed. Passenger trains for the army leave the Washington depot daily at 9.50 A. M. and 2.5 P. M. without stoppage in Alexandria, and all army passes are countersigned there by Capt. Beckwith, of Gen. Patrick’s staff; passes for Virginia other than for the army are examined at Alexandria. All passes must be presented for signature before 2 P. M. each day.

Gen. Patrick, has issued an order to supply the army of the Potomac with oysters. He publishes an advertisement inviting bids, the lowest bidder to get the contract. “He also has under consideration an arrangement to get up supplies of fowl, game, fish, canned milk, &c., at lower rates than furnished by the sutlers.”

The anniversary of the landing of the Pilgrims was celebrated by the New England Society in New York on Tuesday evening.—Speeches were made by Gens. Burnside and Sickles, Admiral Faragut, James T. Brady, John P. Hale, Henry Ward Beecher, and others.

There were 10,520 Federal prisoners in Richmond on the 18th instant. There were eleven deaths among them on the same day.
