An effort is making in Washington, to increase the salary of the Clerks in the Departments. There is a per contra to their claims, we observe. A communication in the Star, signed a "Soldier's Wife," alludes to the complaint of the \$1600 clerks, and says:—"I, sir, am the wife of a private soldier, who is now in Gen. Grant's army—his wages being only \$16 per month, or \$192 per annum. \$10 per month goes for room rent, leaving but \$6 for clothing, food, fuel, and many other family necessaries for myself and two children.—Now, if a Treasury Clerk cannot provide for his family with \$1,600 how can a private soldier, with \$192, provide for his family even the necessaries of life, laying aside all luxuries?"

Gen. McCollum, Director and General Manager of Military Railroads, has been ordered to despatch a party of officers and operatives to take charge of the railroad stock and property captured at Savannah, and in conjunction with the officers of the Quartermaster's Department of the South, make all arrangements necessary for their efficient repair and use in the operations in South Carolina and Georgia.

Mr. B. S. Osborn, Naval Reporter, New York, and correspondent of the English Army and Navy Gazette, has been arrested and ordered to trial for furnishing to the public press and requesting the publication of the details of the Wilmington expedition, thereby causing the Confederates to reinforce the works at Federal Point. Mr. Osborn is now in the Old Capitol Prison.

The official exhibit of the president of the Washington Gaslight Company purports to show a loss last year of over \$28,000, the company being compelled to furnish gas at gold prices.
