## GENERAL NEWS.

The Tennessee State Convention has unanimously passed a resolution declaring slavery forever abolished and prohibited throughout the State; and also a resolution prohibiting the Legislature from recognizing property in slaves; forbidding it from requiring compensation to be made to the owners: abrogating the declaration of State independence with the military league made in 1861 with the Confederate States, and all laws and ordinances made in pursuance of them.

The Paris papers say:—"Nothing can be more varied and fantastic than the style of dressing the hair at this moment. Some ladies have adopted that of the Empress, wearing small flat curls in front, almost entirely covering the forehead with bands of velvet or gold, or jewels, binding the hair as we see it done in antique cameos. Few faces, however, will bear this trying style. Others have the hair drawn up, and then a mass of long narrow ringlets falling forward, while larger ones fall down at the back of the head."

Much speculation is indulged in concerning Gen. Butler's successor, but as yet nothing definite is known on the subject. The impression prevails in military circles that the Army of the James will be detached from the Department of Virginia and North Carolina.

The Chivington massacre of the Indians in Colorado has excited a sentiment in Congress which demands an immediate and rigid investigation of the treatment of this race throughout the far West. It is charged that the Indians are purposely incited to hostility by reckless speculating adventurers.

Some rascally tobacconists in Philadelphia make a practice of mixing large quantities of sumac, which costs about three cents a pound, with their tobacco, and sell it thus adulterated as the genuine article.
