The Internal Revenue Department has authorized the publication of the returns of incomes given in to the officers in New York.— This is done to procure hereafter correct returns. It is believed that a vast proportion of the returns for 1863 are fraudulent, and that the government is cheated out of at least half the revenue to which it is entitled under the law.

The N. Y. Times has the following:—

Commodore Porter in his dispatch to the Navy Department dated the 9th, is very severe in his criticisms upon Gen. Spurgeon, the distinguished Baptist preacher in London, has renounced the ministerial title of Reverend. He wishes to be addressed without any title other than his own name. He has announced his intention to publish a new monthly magazine with this odd title—"The sword and the trowel, or record of combat with sin and labor for the Lord."

The New York Express speaking of newspapers says; "Scores and scores of journals have been put out of existence by the high prices of labor and material, and others have nearly starved or lost money. Only great economy, industry, and energy can bring success to journalism."

The New York Express says:—"Henry Winter Davis is preparing a speech upon the administration of the Navy, in which, it is understood, he is to attack Mr. Welles."— [Doubtful.]

It is reported that Gen. Sheridan will be assigned to the command of the Army of the James. The same report says Gen. Emory, of the 19th corps, will probably be left temporarily in command of the Army of the Shenandoah.
