

The United States Senate has concurred in the joint resolution from the House, requesting the President to give notice of the termination of the reciprocity treaty. The chief argument in favor of the resolution was that the treaty is incompatible with our revenue system. It exempts many commodities from the operation of even internal taxation.

The termination of the treaty, together with the passport system lately enforced by order of Secretary Seward, have had the effect to injure the interests of some of our railroads, and particularly of the Michigan Central.

The Committee of Ways and Means are very closely engaged upon the important subjects of taxation and public debt and the form of Government promises to pay. — *Nat. Int.*

By the steamship Ocean Queen, at New York, we have later dates from South America. The Ocean Queen had nearly four hundred thousand dollars in gold on freight. Reinforcements had arrived to the Spanish fleet cruising in Peruvian waters, and the Peruvian naval commander had declined risking an engagement. The Peruvian Government having communicated the fact to the Columbian Congress, that body had replied that "Peru had better leave fighting alone." It was expected that the Spanish fleet would shortly appear at Callao and bring the difficulty to a crisis by threatening to enforce an ultimatum.

There is quite an excitement in the medical world concerning the prospectus of an enterprising company who propose to institute "a Madeira" in the neighborhood of London for the purpose of arresting the fearful ravages of tubercular and bronchial consumption that are fearful in that country, nearly one-half of the mortality of adults being attributable to that disease. The company's "artificial Madeira" will consist of some twenty acres of land covered over with glass after the fashion of a greenhouse. Everything in it will remind one of the tropics. The fruits, flowers and trees will be tropical. In short, it will be "a Madeira" just outside of London.

The New York and Washington Steamship Company, have tendered the use of their steamer "Rebecca Clyde," free of all charges, to be used in conveying supplies for the relief of the people of Savannah. She sailed from New York for that port on Saturday last, with the first cargo. Mr. Eldridge & Co., are the agents here.

The N. Y. Express says:—"The House Committee on Elections, after a protracted session over the Louisiana case, have decided not to admit any of the members except those from New Orleans." [But this is contradicted, and all the members, it is said, are to be admitted.]

Herschel V. Johnson, the Douglas candidate for Vice President in 1860, had all his silverware and valuables taken from him by the troops during the march through Georgia.
