WAR NEWS.

The Richmond Sentinel, of Monday last, reports all quiet along the lines on the James river, with no prospect of an immediate resumption of active hostilities, in consequence of the impracticable condition of the roads.

A telegram from General Grant's headquarters, states that the Danville Railroad, for a distance of forty-five miles, was destroyed by the recent heavy rains, every bridge and culvert between Danville and Greensboro' having been washed away. The Confederates have a large force of workmen engaged in the reconstruction of the road. In the meantime, we are told, Gen. Lee's army is suffering greatly for want of supplies.

Gen. Rosser is said, unofficially, to have captured at Beverly, West Virginia, seven hundred of the garrison, a large amount of Commissary and Quartermaster's stores, and a great number of horses. Colonel Imboden was seriously wounded in the demonstration made some weeks since by Torbert's cavalry, on Gordonsville. He is now reported to be in a fair way to recover.

Admiral Porter's official report of the capture of Fort Fisher, N. C., gives details of the operations on Sunday up to 10 o'clock at night when the occupation of the fort by the Union troops was signalled, and the fire of the fleet ceased. Fort Fisher, at the time of the assault, was garrisoned by 800 men, and in the upper forts there were 500 men. Besides these, a relief of about 1,500 had been brought down the river on Sunday morning. The struggle on Sunday is represented to have been a terrific one, not surpassed, Admiral Porter says, by any of the events of the war.—Fourteen hundred marines and sailors were sent from the Union fleet to participate in the assault. They attacked the fort at a different point from the infantry forces, and met with the most vigorous resistance, being mistaken for the main body of Gen. Terry's army, and were repulsed, with a loss of 200 in killed and wounded, including a number of officers.

It has been ascertained that Col. Moseby is now at Lynchburg. He is recovering from his wound; and it is believed that he will be in the saddle again shortly.

From the Shenandoah Valley it is reported that the Confederates have built a telegraph line from Staunton to a point near Fisher's Hill. Gen. Rosser is recruiting his cavalry in the vicinity of Woodstock.

Several thousand veteran troops belonging to the fifteenth and seventeenth army corps reached Nashville from Chattanooga on Monday last, en route to join Sherman at Savannah via New York.
