It has been discovered that an English highway robber's newly invented instrument has lately been brought to this country, which is one of the most dangerous weapons the infernal genius of a criminal brain has ever invented. It is called the "sand club," and its use is most certain to produce death. It is, about strong canvass, in the shape of eight inches twenty inches long, and from six to eight inches in circumference. This bag of sand weighs from five to ten pounds, and has great advantages over the ordinary club or judgeon, brass knuckles or slung shot. It will not rebound after a blow is struck, and leaves no mark or bruise.

The New York Express, of Tuesday, says: "The police reports daily demonstrate the fact that New York is now infested by large and desperate classes of criminals, who seem to have no fear of the law, and who are, consequently, perpetrating some of the most outrageous acts of violence and plunder that have ever marked the criminal annals of our city. Their acts do not consist in any one peculiar class of crime, but take in the whole range of offences known to the criminal law, from petit larceny to highway robbery, burglary and murder."

The Washington Star says: "We hear it stated that Mr. Blair succeeded in the main object of his mission, i. e., the recovery of important title-deeds, papers of a confidential character, &c., taken from his residence at Silver Spring, by Breckinridge's raiders. On Mr. Blair's entrance into Richmond he was met by several old friends, and one of them, Col. Hatch, invited him to his house as his guest."

Brooklyn is the city of churches and the paradise of ministers. Here are found the largest congregations, the fattest salaries, and the hugest presents. Some time ago one of the pastors of Brooklyn realized a fortune of \$80,000 by a little speculation in stocks. Another pastor in the same city has been more fortunate. He has "struck ile." He sent down to the oil region \$5,000 by an officer of his church. The officer returned with \$250,000 as the result of the investment. Grateful for his sudden wealth he has offered to his denomination \$40,000 for theological instruction.
