## GENERAL NEWS.

A writer describes Gen. Butler's appearance on the occasion of the receipt of the news of the fall of Fort Fisher as follows: "For a few moments the silence of the grave prevailed in the chamber, and all the members present seemed to be wrapped in contemplation of the irresistibly comical position into which the principal figure in the group was thus suddenly thrown. Gen. Butler did not suffer his abstractedness to last long; but recovering his equanimity before anybody had time to make a single remark, he benignantly took a survey of those around him, and with the simple utterance, 'I am glad of it,' majestically walked out of the room!"

A revolting case is in progress of trial in New York. The plaintiff, Andrew J. Mills-paugh, sues to recover \$50,000 damages from Seth Adams, for alienating from him the affections of his wife, &c. The defendant is a well known and wealthy resident of that city. The plaintiff is a gentleman of about forty years of age, also a resident of New York. Mrs. Adams, formerly Mrs. Mills-paugh, is rather good looking, about 26 years of age.

The subject of Gen. Payne's rule at Paducah, Kentucky, gave rise in the U. S. Senate to a sharp discussion, Messrs. Conness and Powell indulging in personalities verging on a breach of parliamentary decorum. The further consideration of the question was postponed until Monday, when the Military Committee will report.

The Montreal Telegraph Company have completed arrangements to carry their wires down through Lower Canada and New Brunswick to intersect with the wires of the American Telegraph Company at Sackville, N. B., in anticipation of the speedy completion of the Atlantic telegraph cable from Ireland to Newfoundland.

Petitions from numbers of the loyal citizens of Maryland, are being presented to the Legislature of that State, asking compensation for their slaves freed under the provision of the new Constitution.

Private telegrams from the Plains report further Indian outrages on the Overland Mail route, between Fort Kearney and Julesburgh, on the Platte River, by which the Overland coaches have been driven from the route.

The first decision of Chief Justice Chase, in the Supreme Court of the U. S. was, that West Virginia is legally a State. The decision was given on the question of placing the name of that State on the list when calling the docket.

It is announced that O. A. P. Nicholson, who was Andrew Johnson's colleague in the United States Senate, prior to the war, has returned to his home in Columbia, Tennessee, after a long sojourn within the Confederate lines.
