

INDIAN COMMITTEE.—A resolution was yesterday adopted authorizing the appointment of a joint committee, composed of three Senators and four members of the House, to sit during the recess, for the purpose of examining Indians chiefs and others concerning the condition and treatment of the various tribes. The examination is to be very rigid, and will, it is expected, not only result in the punishment of many old offenders on the Western frontier, but lead to important changes in the present system of trade with, and government of the Indians.—*Wash. Star.*

MILITARY MOVEMENTS.—The St. Louis Union of the 13th inst. says: "We are apprized of a great military movement that will startle the public in a few days. Its details are contraband at present." The Boston Journal, of January 17, adds: "We received intelligence from the West yesterday of an important military movement, but withhold it for obvious reasons."

DANIEL WEBSTER AND EDWARD EVERETT. There were just three days difference in the age reached by these eminent statesmen and friends at the time of their respective deaths. The former was seventy years nine months and six days, the latter seventy years, nine months and three days old. Mr. Everett spoke the funeral oration before the Massachusetts Legislature on the occasion of the death of John Quincy Adams.

The National Intelligencer says:—"We have good reason for the belief that Secretary Fessenden does not mean to commit himself to any scheme of finance that would hamper him after he resumes his seat in the Senate.—He proposes simply to administer the affairs of his department upon the basis that existed when he took the Treasury seals. If any radical departure is taken from the existing status Congress must initiate it."

George B. McClellan, Esq., of Orange, late Major General of the army and Democratic candidate for the Presidency, was in this city today, and procured at the United States collector's office a passport to go to Europe in the steamer China. He also paid \$195.75 war tax on an income of 3,915 during 1863. His pay as major general last year was \$4,173, and from other sources \$342, amounting in all to \$4,515, from which \$600 deduction was made.—*Newark Advertiser.*

Sweden has made her mission to the United States a full one, having some time ago retired Count Piper, Charge d'Affaires, and transferred him to another mission. Count Audenfreid, appointed Minister Plenipotentiary from that country, has arrived in Washington.

Mr. Lewis, United States commissioner of internal revenue, has issued orders to collectors and assessors throughout the country, forbidding them to allow the names of taxpayers to be copied from their list for publication in newspapers.

The annual celebration of the Philodemic Society, of Georgetown, was held on Thursday, Mr. R. Ross Perry, read a beautiful poem on "The Ravages of Time." Mr. James A. Wise delivered the annual address.
