SAVANNAH—"Carlton," the war correspondent of the Boston Journal, describes the scenes which attended the distribution of the Northern supplies in Savannah, and says:

"There is a large crowd of Northern men here, who came expecting to make their fortunes; but they will be disappointed. There is nothing but cotton and rice in the city. The Government owns the cotton and the city the rice. The rice will be used to supply the wants of the people. The country is not held by our troops, and no effort will be made to take possession of it at present, for General Sherman is moving in another direction. The people have no money. There is no gold or silver laid away in old stockings. They have had Confederate scrip, and that is waste paper now. The citizens, one and all, are at the bottom of the hill. They have got to recommence society and new lives. All of their property was in land, negroes, buildings, goods, Confederate bonds, railroad bonds and Confederate currency. The rice lands are here, but by the appended order of General Sherman it will be seen that they are to pass into the hands of the negroes. The negroes are free, the stores are empty, the goods which they contained, which came from the North, have been sold and used up, turned into Confederate bonds and scrip; the railroads are torn up, and the community in every sense is poverty stricken. How can they trade?"

RE-ARREST OF A BALTIMORE MERCHANT.—Mr. Charles E. Waters, of the firm of Charles E. Waters & Co., hardware dealers, was arrested yesterday morning at an early hour, at his residence, by an officer from Washington, and the two left this city in the morning train for Philadelphia. Their destination was not disclosed by the officer, but it is supposed that Mr. Waters has been sentenced to a term of imprisonment at the Albany penitentiary, as he was one of the Baltimore merchants arrested in October last and taken to Washington upon the information of Pardon Worsley, charged with selling goods to blockade runners. It was reported here yesterday that Mr. James H. Weedon, connected with the house of Hamilton Easter & Co., and arrested at the same time, had also been carried North under guard, upon the same train. With regard to this gentleman, however, nothing definite is known, and the rumor may have arisen from the sudden and unexpected arrest of Mr. Waters.—*Balt. Gazette.*

The Northern papers state the Mr. Singleton, who went to Richmond on an unofficial mission of peace and remained there after Mr. Blair had taken his departure, has returned to Washington. From free intercourse with the Confederate authorities, he is said to have drawn the conclusion that there is no probability at present that the South will entertain any propositions for peace which do not include the concession of independence. He also states that the Confederate leaders are entirely confident of their ability to carry on the war until their independence is achieved, and that they can accomplish this without arming their slaves.
