SOUTHERN NEWS.

The Confederate Congress has under discussion the subject of employing negroes in the army, and some animated debates have taken place.

Maj. A. L. Rogers' proposed alteration in the Confederate flag has been adopted. The change made is the division of the field into a white and red bar.

Gen. Beauregard has arrived in Augusta, and taken charge of military operations there. It is said the forces at Branchville are also under his control.

Gold sold in Raleigh, on Monday, at thirty-five dollars for one dollar. Ten days ago it sold at sixty-five dollars to seventy dollars.

An explosion took place on Friday at the powder mills in the vicinity of Columbia, S. C. A small building was destroyed, and two men seriously injured.

A lot of sugar was sold in Columbus, Ga., on Saturday last, at seven to eight dollars per pound.

About three hundred bales of cotton, were burned at Griffin on Monday, January 15th, the work of an incendiary.

Mr. Long, of Ohio, made speech in the U. S. House of Representatives, yesterday which is thus reported in the Washington Chronicle:

Mr. Long made a speech, saying the position he occupied last year had been strengthened by subsequent events. He regarded the recent Presidential election as a farce. The coercion policy has failed, as it ever must do, under the providence of God, because it is in derogation of law. Our armies and their able leaders, though they have done all that brave men could do, have failed to overcome the South, because to do so is an impossibility. He did not believe we can make war against a sovereign State.

Mr. Broomall asked whether he believed in the right of a State to secede.

Mr. Long replied he did, and that there was nothing in the Constitution to prohibit it.

Mr. Broomall asked wherein did the opinions of the gentleman differ from those of Jeff. Davis, and he further inquired whether Jeff. Davis was right in trying to get States out of the Union.

Mr. Long replied he was not here to answer for the opinions of Jefferson Davis, nor was he here to say whether Davis was right or wrong. He was not here to curse or praise him. If abuse would do anything, he should prefer the gentleman from Pennsylvania (Mr. Broomall), together with Andrew Johnson and Parson Brownlow, should curse him out of his boots, if that would put down the rebellion in short order.

He continued to speak against coercion, and concluded by a review of the finances.

A hundred black walnut coffins recently arrived at San Francisco. They had been shipped from Boston at first to the Isle of France, and there being no sale there for them they were sent to Melbourne, and from there they were brought to California.
